



Dear Parents, Students and Friends

At Chapel last Friday, visiting speaker and medical doctor Dr Cheah Fung Fong spoke on "Gender". She highlighted God's plan for male and female but acknowledged the struggles some people may have with self-identification on the basis of gender. She then broadened the topic to remind everyone that we all struggle with something from time to time, and that these struggles may result from depression, family issues and relationships, physical disabilities, academic issues, procrastination, distractions, and addictions (e.g. computer games and social media).

At some time, we all feel trapped, chained, locked in stone or heavily weighed down. The Accademia Gallery museum in Florence, Italy, houses many famous pieces of art, and on display are four unfinished works by the great Michelangelo, all about 2.7m tall and created between 1520 and 1534. These statues are collectively known as Michelangelo's Slaves. They are the Bearded Slave, the Awakening Slave, the Young Slave and The Atlas. They are deliberately unfinished to show what it might feel like to be forever enslaved and never able to free themselves.


If we recognise that there are chains in our lives, we can do something about it. We don't have to carry the burden alone. Young or old, we can talk to a friend, teacher, or counsellor. "A trouble shared is a trouble halved'. We can also pray... 'For I am the Lord your God who takes hold of your right hand and says to you, Do not fear; I will help you (Isaiah 41:13) and 'Call to me and I will answer you and tell you great and unsearchable things you do not know.' (Jeremiah 33:3). Don't struggle alone!

Today marks the end of Term 3. We especially thank all those who attended Tuesday's Parent Teacher Meeting – a most worthwhile exercise – and we also thank the students, the PSP and wider parent body for their wonderful affirmation of their teachers at today's Teachers' Day celebrations.












Barcelona International Youth Science Challenge



"We are what we eat." While this is a commonly used phrase, it was only after I participated in the Barcelona International Youth Science Challenge (BIYSC) from the 9 to 20 July, did I start to understand the depth and complexity of this saying.

While I was spoilt for choice with the many research projects offered, from quantum physics to uncovering the hidden diversity of the oceans, I was immediately drawn towards the Nutrition and Health project.



Nutrition and health has always been of great interest to me. Ever since I could walk, I've had anaphylactic allergies, which made me develop a habit of checking ingredient labels on the packaged food I eat. That was when I started to notice they contain numerous chemicals and ingredients I could barely pronounce, spurring the curiosity in me as to what we put in our

bodies. This lead me to explore various diets to better understand their impacts on our health and environment, which is one reason why I eat a fully plant-based diet.

During the two-week programme, I delved further into my interest in nutrition and health, together with eight other participants, exploring a wide range of connected topics. We worked with scientists from the August Pi i Sunyer Biomedical Research Institute (IDIBAPS), researching together on cures for diabetes, and continued on with researchers and dietitians from the University of Vic-Central University of Catalonia (UVIC) as well as those from the Alícia Foundation, about the complete food production line and farm-to-table concepts.

One key takeaway for me is the idea of interconnectedness. The programme revolved around the idea of Agroecology, the democratisation of knowledge from peasant agriculture, ancestors and scientific research whereby everyone in the food production line intertwine with one another. With the combination of this knowledge, we learnt that we could reduce commercialisation, creating optimal results by connecting with our food and building a community.

At the end of the programme, not only did I learn about how food impacts our health and our environment, but I have also formed invaluable friendships from all over the world, including France, Spain, Tunisia and Hungary!



Ultimately, nutrition is an essential building block in our lives, but it is an ever-changing topic in science. As we evolve, so do our views and research. This is why we have to keep pursuing answers through research.

Though a few families showed interest, I decided to accept an offer from Ms Katia Chapoutier and Mr Damien Augeyrolles – two accomplished filmmakers journalists. They have four children, with one being their newborn baby. At the beginning of my stay, I worked with the children for two days a week, teaching them English and taking them to school. This was a fantastic experience as I communicated and shared my knowledge, whilst also learning more French from the children themselves, in the process of translation and through play. During this period, I shadowed Damien at work and saw the filmmaking process.

After visiting Paris regularly for a month or so, the family offered to take me on their family holiday to Italy, and also later hired me in a more involved role. With the money I had saved up, I organised a trip around France. I called on Katia and Mdm Rousset to help me find families around the country with whom I could live for a few days at a time. They very graciously acquiesced. I organised a month-long tour to eight cities by bus: Strasbourg (and Colmar), Lyon, Nice, (Grasse, Antibes, Cannes, Monaco, Èze), Marseille, Toulouse (and Carcassonne), Bordeaux, Nantes (and Angers) as well as La Rochelle (and I'Île de Ré). My trip was spectacular. I met many amazing people, ate lovely local food, and saw the many sides of France's culture and beauty.

I would like to thank the many people who made this trip possible. I also would like to think the trip helped open my mind further to new experiences and led me to improve my communication skills, being in a foreign place with people who began as strangers.
