Happy 132nd birthday ACS! Birthdays are family occasions and times of celebration, remembrance and opportunities which serve to strengthen the bonds which hold families together. Founder's Day is our ACS family birthday celebration and on Thursday we celebrated 132 years since Bishop Oldham established the first ACS school and 13 years since Bishop Solomon dedicated ACS (International). This year's Guest of Honour was Mr Hugh Lim, an illustrious ACS Old Boy who has had an outstanding career in the Singapore Armed Forces and in government. He was a Brigadier-General and Chief of Staff, and he is now the CEO of the Singapore Building and Construction Authority. He gave an inspiring and informative message, exhorting those present to focus on the '4 P's - Purpose, Perseverance, Partnership and Prayer' in all that they do to achieve success.

The Bishop of the Methodist Church in Singapore, Rev Dr Chong Chin Chung, had his annual Founder's Day message read to the assembly by our Chaplain, Rev Joel Yong. The Bishop encouraged everyone to develop strong, personal, face-to-face relationships with each other in order to overcome the many different, distorted and negative influences which pervade social media; and to always speak the truth in love.

President of the ACSOBA, Mr Lim Tat, also gives an annual message, this year delivered by Mr Paul Lee from the ACSOBA. He spoke about the strengths of being an ACSian and of receiving an ACS education. He said that the ACS of the future must rely on today's ACS students to keep the ACS traditions going and to keep the ACS flag flying.

Motivational Speaker, Dr William Tan

Dr William Tan recently spoke to the school at assembly. Dr Tan contracted polio when he was two and became paralysed from the waist down. He was also bullied severely, expelled from school, and suffered stage 4 cancer. Notwithstanding these setbacks, he went on to become a neuroscientist and a medical doctor, winning scholarships to Harvard and Oxford. Dr Tan is also an accomplished sportsman.

An Asian-Pacific Games triple gold medalist, he has competed in the 1988 Seoul Paralympics, the World Games, and the Commonwealth Games. Over the past twenty years he has participated in marathons and raised millions of dollars for charitable organisations both locally and internationally. After his leukemia diagnosis, Dr Tan focused his energy on table tennis. He has represented Singapore at the ASEAN Para Games 2011 and 2014.

Dr. Tan encouraged the assembly to never give up, to live their dreams, use the power of the will, and to change 'IMPOSSIBLE' to "I AM POSSIBLE'. He says that the first steps are the most difficult. Academic Focus in the Boarding School

Home to many MOE scholars, the academic culture in the boarding school is very strong. Self-study time known otherwise as 'Prep Time' plays a key feature in the structure of the hall. Students are expected to report to Prep Rooms to study for 2 hours from $8:00-10:00~\rm p.m.$ every night from Sundays to Thursdays.


