Dear Parents, Students and Friends

Birthdays are family occasions and times of celebration, remembrance and opportunities which serve to strengthen the bonds which hold families together. Founder's Day is our ACS family birthday celebration and last Friday we celebrated 129 years since Bishop Oldham established the first ACS school and 10 years since Bishop Solomon dedicated ACS (International). Our Guest of Honour, Lieutenant General Winston Choo (retired) is an ACS Old Boy whose service culminated in his appointment as Singapore's Chief of Defence Force from 1974 to 1992. After a military career spanning 33 years, he held diplomatic appointments as Singapore's envoy to Australia, Fiji, South Africa, Papua New Guinea and Israel. He is also a former chairman of the Singapore Red Cross Society. Lt General Choo spoke about cherishing the time we have at school, making and keeping good school friends, and doing our very best both in and out of the classroom. He stated that his ACS education prepared him well for a life time of service, helping develop his character and his integrity, and enabling him to endure on the battlefield. He remembered that he was one of the first ACSians to make the military a career at a time when most of his contemporaries were entering business or the professions via university.

At Founder's Day we also launched SG50 ACtS – a joint initiative from the six ACS schools to celebrate Singapore's 50th birthday. The six schools will undertake a total of over 50 Acts of Service during 2015, both in Singapore and abroad. ACS (International) is contributing 10 Acts and supporting two combined ACS projects. The first combined project was completed last week and featured ACS (International), ACS Barker and ACS Primary working together to produce a 30m long mural in the upgraded Amoy Street Hawker Centre. Amoy Street was the site of the first ACS school. See elsewhere for photos.

Our Founder's Day celebration was also attended by Board chairman Mr Tan Wah Thong and members of the Board of Management; and the ceremony featured musical and dance performances by our students ranging from classical music to modern dance.

On Sunday a number of Board, staff and students attended the annual ACS Sunday church service at our Holland Village Methodist Church and later that evening the Founder's Day dinner hosted by the ACSOBA.

Next week is the last week of term and we wish everyone a safe and enjoyable week's break from lessons.

Restricted Entry to School by Vehicles at Start of the Day

Due to the heavy congestion at the school gate by both vehicles and foot traffic we are restricting vehicle entry to the school grounds to just staff cars between 7.30 and 8.10am. This took effect from Monday 12 January.

This means that parents will not be able to enter the school grounds to drop off their children. All drop offs must be outside the main gate at the drop off zone. On wet days however, parents will still be able to access the covered drop off zone outside the Administration Block. With an increased roll there is increased congestion at the school entrance and students on foot are contributing to that. Parents are encouraged to make use of the back gate via Holland Close as a much less congested alternative to drop off their children.



ICAS Science 2015: An opportunity for all Year 3 Students

International Competitions and Assessments for Schools (ICAS) is a highly regarded assessment programme for schools offering examinations in Computer Skills, English, Mathematics, Science and Writing. ICAS is organised by The University of New South Wales. All Year 3 students will enter the Science competition. The cost fee of \$9 per student will be covered by the school and results will be available to parents and students online.

The Science test involves being given an hour to attempt 45 multiple choice questions. It will take place on Tuesday 21 April from 3.30 to 4.30pm in the Science laboratories. Students will be required to apply their knowledge, skills and understanding across five skills areas of observing / measuring, interpreting, predicting / concluding, investigating and reasoning / problem solving.

Tennis

Over the past two months our Under 19 tennis boys competed in the season 2 ACSIS U19 tournament coming third despite entering the tournament the first time. They played against UWC Dover, UWC East, Canadian International School and Stamford American International School.

Football CCA

We've had a very busy football schedule since the second week of school. The junior boys competed in the ACSIS Under-14 Division 3 tournament. Many of our players were new Year 1s, but they gave their best in every game. After 6 matches, they won 3, drew 1 & lost 2 to finish 4th. The intermediate boys took part in the Singapore Schools Sports Council's 'B' Division South Zone competition. This has always been a difficult competition for our boys, largely due to the lack of training opportunities prior to the first match. After 5 first round matches, they won 1, drew 1 & lost 3 to finish 4th, ahead of ACS (Independent).

The senior boys are the midst of the AIS Cup, organised by the Australian International School. There are 8 schools competing - AIS, OFS, LFS (2 teams), GESS, SACAC, SJII & us. To date, they have played 3 matches, winning against SJII (3-2), drawing with LFS2 (2-2) & narrowly losing to SACAC (0-1). For now they are in 3rd place but there are still 4 matches to play. The initial target is a top 4 finish, so as to qualify for the Playoffs in May. Towards the end of March, 20 of these boys will be selected to represent the school in the President's Challenge Cup. This is the premier Singapore schools' football tournament for boys under-20.

On Saturday 28/2, as part of the Founder's Day celebrations, a team of senior & intermediate boys took part in the ACS Past vs Present 9-a-side tournament organised by the ACSOBA. The team played very well through the group stage but were unfortunate to lose 1-0 in the semi-finals to ACS (Independent). They finished 3rd after beating ACS 1985 in the 3rd/4th place playoff. Congratulations to ACS (Independent) for winning the day and being an extremely good host.

Volleyball CCA



The school Volleyball teams have been heavily involved in competition since the New Year with both boys and girls Under 19's teams having made a great start to the season competing in an open-aged tournament held at UWC Dover on Sunday evenings. The competition standard is very high with both university and adults clubs competing alongside high school teams. So far the ACS (International) Girls teams have recorded victories over the Overseas Family School and the Singapore American School. The Boys team has managed to overcame the 'International Kakis' and UWC Dover to maintain their 100% winning record in the competition.



In another competition the ACS (International) Girls team won silver medal in a 1-day tournament held at ACS (International). Playing 4 games back to back, our girls showed great determination and stamina only to be beaten in a close final against the American Volleyball Academy.
