Dear Parents, Students and Friends

The recent terrorist actions in Sri Lanka and New Zealand have horrified us all. It seems unbelievable that extremists would wilfully target civilians, women and children in order to further their cause. Terrorism perpetrated by extremists goes against all that civil society represents.

I was in Christchurch 2km away from the central city mosque when the shootings started. The central city shut down with little traffic on the roads apart from police cars racing by with sirens blaring. Radio and TV gave constant updates. Social media gave conflicting reports. All schools initiated lock-down procedures and students were retained at school and supervised by teachers until early evening. Initial social media reports indicated that there were at least four gunmen, two of whom were arrested as they attacked a local high school and another had fired shots at the main hospital's Emergency Department. As the situation became clearer, it transpired that a lone gunman had targeted two mosques, that the "two gunmen" arrested at the high school were parents going to collect their child from the lock-down, and that the hospital had not been attacked. However, the spreading of misinformation ensured that the terrorist acts achieved one of the aims of spreading fear and uncertainty.

Some positive outcomes from the Christchurch tragedy included the country-wide coming together of different racial, religious and cultural groups in solidarity; the banning and collection of semi-automatic weapons; the evidence of strong and empathetic leadership by the Prime Minister; and the recognition that reliable social media is vital. International support was also heartening. As well as world leaders expressing their support, one tweet from a well-known Australian Anglican priest Father Rod Bower using the Muslim word "salam" (meaning peace) helped convey unity in grief across mainstream religions: "From Christ Church Gosford to #Christchurch New Zealand. Salam (peace) to the fallen. Salam to the injured. Salam to the grieving. Salam for our future."

We should continue to strive for tolerance, openness, non-violence and intercultural harmony. Diversity is a strength. As it says in Galatians 3: 28, "There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is no male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus."

We will be holding a lock-down practice this term – we hope we never need to use it in reality – but like fire drills, we do need to be prepared.

Best wishes for the remaining three weeks of this term.

We wish Claire success in her upcoming competition.


