

The final assembly of each term is our academic presentation assembly where we present certificates to those gaining Principal's Awards and Distinction certificates. It is pleasing to see students striving to gain these awards with numbers increasing each term. Our congratulations to the individual recipients who are listed elsewhere in this newsletter.

Last week in Chapel I spoke about the Parable of the Talents – where one servant was given five talents, another two and another one talent. There are many lessons to be taken from this biblical parable, including the message that we are not all given neither same nor equal gifts. We each have different giftings and we should not compare our giftings with those of others. We are each accountable for the gifts we are given, and we are each required to work hard in using those gifts. The Master used the same words to praise the servant who was given two talents and who doubled them, as he did with the one who doubled his five talents ('Well done good and faithful servant'). Using equal praise to both the good servants implies the individuals are of equal worth even if the gifts are not equal. Not everyone can make the Principal's List – we each have different giftings – but we are each valued equally.

Other points made about the Parable of the Talents included the message that our talents are 'gifts' given to us. They are not earned but freely given to us, yet we are accountable for using our gifts and we are required to make good use of our talents. ('To whom much is given, much is demanded.' Luke 12:48). Additionally, a person with 'level five' talent in one area might have two, one or even zero talent in other areas – we are all unique. Whatever gifts we have, each gift is valuable. Even one talent is very valuable. In biblical times one talent equaled 6,000 denarii, and one denarius was a day's wage. To someone on \$50,000 per year, one talent in today's money is worth over \$1,000,000!

We wish all of those students and teachers travelling on school service and UK university trips over the holidays a safe, rewarding and enjoyable time; and indeed these best wishes go to everyone who is travelling over the June holidays. We look forward to seeing everyone in early July, and we look forward to Year 4 and 6 students using their talents to best effect in preparing for the Prelim Examinations which start on Day 1 of Term 3!

#### Staff First Aid Course

The First Aid course which was held over three Saturdays on 30 April, 7 and 14 May was a very meaningful and enriching one. The thirteen of us had a really enjoyable time with our instructor, Mr Mahendran. He made First Aid come to life for us through his recount of many exciting, albeit sometimes painful and heartbreaking rescues. His love for saving lives inspired many of us to take this course seriously and of course, to pass the frightful tests on the last day of the course. We truly understood how our students felt about tests having had to sit for it. Fortunately, we had an understanding instructor who provided tips for the test as we were sitting for it.



We were exposed to realistic scenarios in schools involving students and teachers alike. Very often we had to partner each other and conduct First Aid on each another. We had of course, very willing casualties who had the privilege of having fellow teachers come to their rescue. We were taught CPR (Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation) and how to use the AED (Automated External Defibrillator) machine. We were also trained on how to provide First Aid to conscious and unconscious casualties, to those casualties who were hyperventilating, had burns and had difficulty breathing.



We have felt that this course helped to strengthen the bond between us. As a school, it is indeed each and everyone's responsibility to look out for one another and for both students and staff to come together in aid of

someone should an emergency arise.



Just before we went away for the Easter weekend, the Ambassadors conducted a training workshop for the Ambassador Nominees. It aimed to boost confidence in public speaking and improve proactiveness in one-to-one communication and interactions. The event was graced by Ms Wong Lee Jeng, former MediaCorp host, and Mr Eugene Seah, a dynamic trainer with 15 years of experience in marketing, communication and management. ## Migrant Workers Association: 6 May briefing, 15 May Migrant Workers Lunch

Despite the stress of looming deadlines for Internal Assessments and Extended Essays, some of our IB students took time out to help migrant workers in Singapore. They wanted to express their thanks to the migrant workers for their continual contribution to building Singapore. They packed appreciation packs containing soap, chocolate, MRT cards, and international phone cards as a token of thanks and affection. In this simple way, our students were able to show gratitude to those who build our city.



The students learned that many migrant workers contribute remarkable amounts of labour to the construction industry, but do so on very low wages. Thus, they felt it would be meaningful to provide additional support. At a new recreation centre for migrant workers, 30 of our IB students helped to survey the workers about their working conditions, to check whether they are being properly cared for at work. They also served lunch to the workers, and had lunch together with them. It was a great opportunity for the workers and our students to learn more about each other, and it was clear that they really enjoyed each other's company. It was a very rewarding day that made our students think about the contribution foreigners make to society here in Singapore, and raised some questions about the current level of financial reward offered by companies.



## United: A Brighter World For the Blind: Concert, 29 April, Gaming Ongoing

Not all businesses in Singapore allow guide dogs on their premises. The blind and visually impaired face many difficulties when doing everyday things such as going out to eat, or doing household chores. Upon learning this, some of our year 5 students decided to initiate an awareness and fundraising campaign.



Led by Vijay Venkatesh, a team of 29 students organized a multifaceted project. They held a fundraiser concert on 29 April in aid of the Guide Dogs Association for the Blind, Singapore, and raised \$720 in

total. The students also gathered their gaming equipment and games, hiring them out to other students on a weekly basis. Their campaign will continue for a few more months, and we look forward to seeing the fruits of their hard work.
