Dear Parents, Students and Friends

Parents Satisfaction Survey Our sincere thanks to all those parents who completed this survey over the past fortnight. The results show that the vast majority of parents are generally satisfied with the quality of education at ACS (International) with 75.2% of parents rating the school 7 / 10 or better. The mode, or most common score was 8 / 10. The highest rated reasons for sending their children to ACS (International) were academic results, value-added results, quality of staff, small class sizes and international curricula. That said, the survey also indicated some areas where we could communicate better, and there were comments both about outstanding teachers and some variable teaching practices. Some of these areas are addressed in a further section elsewhere in this newsletter.

Our thanks to all those parents and students who attended the recent PTM meetings. The teachers always appreciate being able to discuss progress with both student and teacher present. The combining of the IGCSE and IB Diploma Information meetings with the PTMs was a trial initiative to avoid another night meeting. Any feedback on whether the combined event was suitable or not would be appreciated.

This week is the last week of term and we congratulate those students who gained Commendation Certificates as a result of very good term grades. Principal's List and Distinction awardees are listed elsewhere in this newsletter.

The recent Olympic Games has produced many examples of outstanding achievement, and stories abound of athletes who have succeeded against all odds. We have used some of these examples in talks in house and school assemblies. The vast majority of Olympic athletes do not receive a medal. At the Rio Games there were 10,000 athletes, 207 nations, 31 sports, 27 world records and 306 sets of medals. Over 90% of athletes returned home without a medal. Not everyone has the ability of a Schooling, Phelps or Boult. Similarly, despite working very hard many students were not able to get on the Principal's List. Have they failed? No! For some, their time has yet to come, and for others they should be looking to compare themselves with themselves, not with others; that is, seek continual improvement and achieving personal bests. We each have different giftings, and we each excel in different ways.

We wish those travelling over the coming two week holiday a safe and enjoyable break, and remind Year 4 and Year 6 students especially that the holidays are a time for some rest and also time for uninterrupted note making and revision time in preparation for the coming examinations.

Parents Satisfaction Survey

Further to the comments in the Principal's commentary on Page 1, we again thank all those parents who completed the survey. Extra comments supplied at the end of the questionnaire were also appreciated. Both positive and constructive comments were made. Some representative comments included:

"I am happy that my daughter has been given the opportunity to study at ACS (International). The system here is highly encouraging as I feel that it empowers the students to explore and stretch their abilities ... and helps them aspire to do the best they can."

"We appreciate all the efforts of the staff to take care of the students academically and spiritually. We are so glad our children can experience this lovely environment..."

"Teachers should serve the full academic year and not be permitted to leave during the year."

"Teachers can not be reached by phone"

"We appreciate the opportunity to comment here. Students should also be asked for their opinion"

"My child is much happier here than her local school"

"We are very proud that our children go to this school".

The survey indicated some extra communication is required. We would make the following comments and clarifications.

Communication with Teachers

In addition to face-to-face conversation the expected method of communication with teachers is by using the teacher's school email address. Teachers are expected to reply within 24 hours during the week days. Teachers are not encouraged to give students or parents their own personal phone number, nor join a WhatsApp group with students using their own personal phone. However, some key staff have school phones which are used for verbal and electronic communication including school WhatsApp groups.

Recruiting Teachers

When ACS (International) was set up 11 ½ years ago the policy was to recruit 50% Singaporean teachers and 50% international teachers. This ratio is still required today. Vacancies are advertised both locally (required by law) and internationally. A short list for interview is selected based on academic qualifications and relevant experience. All short listed applicants are interviewed either in person or by Skype. Referees reports are sought. The teacher with the best fit based on qualifications, relevant experience, up to date pedagogy and teaching ability, and 'soft skills' is offered the position. The school re-advertises if we are not satisfied with the calibre of applicants. All teachers must be approved by the Ministry of Education. They are offered initial three year contracts, and these are extended by mutual agreement. The current three year contract cycle ends this December.

Loss of Teachers Through the Year

The Ministry of Education requires the three privately funded local schools – ACS (International), SJII and Hwa Chong – to operate a southern hemisphere academic year like local MoE schools. This puts us at a disadvantage when recruiting and replacing international teachers as most international schools as well as northern hemisphere countries have a different academic year, usually from August to June. We compete with these schools for international staff, and most international school teachers are only able to change schools in August at the end of contract. We try to minimise loss of staff during the year by only giving end-of-year bonuses to staff who finish the year with us. No bonus is awarded to staff who leave during the year.

Student Surveys of Teachers

Every student is asked to complete an annual survey on the teaching and learning in every subject that they take. These surveys are used by the individual teachers as part of the self improvement process, plus by Heads of Faculty and Senior Leadership as part of the annual appraisal and performance review of teachers. These surveys are taken seriously and are an important feature of our school.

New Security Company

We have just finalised a change of security company, and like all changes in the security industry, the changes are immediate. This week Henderson Security was replaced by Global Ritz Protection Pte Ltd. The new company is providing new security guards and they will take time to get to know people. Close checking will therefore take more time than usual. We ask for patience from the school community. We are considering identity tags to help improve our security. Other changes may occur and these will be advised as they are confirmed.

Year 1 Direct School Admission

The school is currently accepting applications for the Direct Admissions programme to Year 1 in 2017. Direct Admissions applicants should contact the Admissions Department to arrange to sit the English and Mathematics entrance tests. All applicants also undertake an oral interview with a senior member of staff. DSA applicants who do not pass the DSA process are still eligible to reapply after the PSLE results are published in November.

Year 5 IBDP Direct Admission

Parents and guardians of students in Year 4 who have gained direct and guaranteed admission to next year's IB Diploma Programme were mailed letters of offer this week. Their place issecured by completing the new Enrolment Contract Form and returning by 23 September. Other IGCSE students are still able to gain entry in the Diploma programme by gaining at least 2As, 2Bs, and 2Cs in the IGCSE examination.

ACS (International) 2017 IBDP Internal Scholarships

Applications are invited from ACS (International) 2016 Year 4 students for the above 2017 scholarships worth \$10,000 each. There are 3 scholarships available.

The successful applicants will have demonstrated:

- 1. Outstanding academic achievement throughout Year 4
- 2. Strong contribution to co-curricular and / or House activities
- 3. Ability to achieve highly in the IB Diploma Programme and give back to the school.

The scholarships will be used to offset the Year 5 IBDP tuition fees. \$5000 will be deducted from the fees payable for each of Semester 1 and Semester 2.

Applications to the Principal consisting of a letter of application listing achievements and contributions to the school close 30 September 2016.

ACS (International) IB Scholarships 2016 – 17

The school offers two full and two half fees scholarships to external students currently studying in Singapore who wish to complete their IB Diploma at ACS (International).

Predicted Grades

Some institutions require either the Preliminary Grades or the Predicted Grades. These grades are not necessarily the same and it is necessary for the student to check carefully which grades are required. ACS (International) does not release Predicted Grades to parents or students as per school policy. In cases where Predicted Grades are required for application elsewhere, the student must make arrangements with the school for them to be sent by courier to the institution or to a reputable agent dealing with the application on their behalf. The current fee for the courier is \$50.

Year 4 and 6 Study Nights

The PSP and school are again hosting extended study nights in the Library on Tuesdays and Thursdays once Year 4 and 6 study leave starts in October. The Library stays open until 8.00 pm with light refreshments provided by PSP. The study nights begin on Thursday 6 October and finish on Thursday 10 November.

Slow and Safe Driving Near School

Parents driving their children to school are reminded to be considerate of the residents and young children in the area, especially in terms of driving slowly and parking in front of the residents gates whilst waiting to pick up students after school.



International Competitions and Assessment

On 19 August 2016, our school's String Orchestra and GuZheng Ensemble collaborated to produce the Strings Concert 2016. The GuZheng Ensemble wowed parents and students alike with delightful pieces such as *Butterfly* and *Fisherman's Song at Dusk*. The String Orchestra followed with western pieces: Vivaldi's double violin concerto, Pizzicato Polka, and highly popular tunes including the Star Wars Theme and Yiruma's River Flows in You. Lastly, the two orchestras combined together with flutist Alexandria Halim to perform the final songs: *Chrysanthemum Terrace* and *Dance of the Yao*.

While the performance only lasted for two hours, the two ensembles invested many hours into training and preparing for this performance. They rehearsed over and over again till late in the evening in order to produce a cohesive performance. Preparation was not easy, as students faced the challenge of honing their craft and fulfilling school commitments at the same time. The long school days with tests and assignments followed by setbacks were particularly tough. However, with the nurturing guidance and leadership of the Strings conductor Mr Lim Soon Lee, and support from teachers-in-charge Ms Carol Ling, Mdm Josephine Teo, Mdm Cheng Wei, Mdm Chen Yongzhen and Ms Yang Yang, they pulled through to create wonderful and mesmerizing melodies. As they finished the last piece, Dance of the Yao, the audience burst into applause, many rising to their feet in their moment of jubilee and delight. For the instrumentalists, their pain from all the challenges all but vanished under the blinding stage lights and the applause, their eyes filling with warm tears, and their hearts swelled with an incredible sense of accomplishment and satisfaction.





For me, it has been a rather incredible journey. As the President of the Strings Orchestra, I felt immense pressure on my back, trying to organize the orchestra coupled with working with the teachers-in-charge and our conductor Mr Lim on top of practising my instrument of choice: the violin. While the journey sure was tough, the rewards were far sweeter than I could have ever hoped for, the sense of accomplishment and jubilee sweeping over me like a tsunami as the concert came to a close. Through this journey, I have fostered a deeper bond with many of the string orchestra members and have made many friends along the way. This experience has been truly meaningful and priceless for me, and I hope that we may experience similar experiences in the future through various concerts and performances, allowing our budding orchestra to develop into a fully-fledged and talented orchestra, capable of performing at a higher level together.

Concert in the Dark

On 13 August, the Holland Village Methodist Church sponsored 20 tickets for a music concert at the Star Performing Arts Centre for the international students in our school. The group included students from the Youth Alpha course (An organization aimed at students to help them learn more about Christianity). The concert was in darkness throughout, and the aim of this was to allow participants to experience the feeling of being visually impaired. There were several well-known artists performing, including Nathan Hartono, an alumnus from our ACS family. The concert ran from 7 to 9 pm, and the music was overwhelmingly good.



Before we entered the concert hall, we had to divide ourselves into groups of 8 and gather in a small dark room. Then we were told to put our hands onto the shoulders of the person in front. As the breeze from the air-conditioner blew on us, we started moving forward into complete darkness, led by our visuallyimpaired guides. The excitement we felt as we walked was incredible. Amazing Science Challenge

This year, ACS (International) sent 3 teams to participate in the Amazing Science X-Challenge (ASXC) held at the Science Centre, in partnership with NUS and DSO.



One of the teams that consisted of three Year 5 students (Akkshaj Singh 5-GHK, Rishi Nandiraju Bharadwaj 5GHK & Purinat Atipas 5OLD) had this to share:

"We were required to construct an exhibit demonstrating a natural science phenomena. We were inspired by the F1, and decided to demonstrate the Doppler Effect. We used a helmet, attached to two tuning forks which swing past the wearer's ears, demonstrating the effect. We also created a poster explaining the effect, and were required to log our progress and creative processes with a logbook.

Our original design was much more complex, involving pipes and curtain rails, and a sound source moving past the observer, but eventually simplified to what it became.

Although we didn't win, this experience helped us discover more about the sciences, (something we were already deeply interested in) and also helped develop our creativity. On the whole, it was an engaging, interesting and enriching experience for all of us."


With this added experience and a heightened sense of adventure, we will definitely be having a go at the competition again in 2017!
