Disruptors, New Normal, New Wine in New Wine Skins

In the business world, a disruptor is usually an entrepreneur or outsider or creative thinker who creates a product, service, or way of doing things which displaces the existing market leaders and eventually replaces them at the helm of the sector (<u>www.businessleader.co.uk</u>). Disruptors think outside the box and take advantage of pressure points and stressors to produce new products and new solutions. Disruptors take advantage of disruption. The changes and innovations which result from disruption are often rapid and take place in times of turbulence.

COVID-19 has been a disruption and has produced much turbulence, and already there are new and accepted ways of doing business and interacting with each other which were just abstract ideas 12 months ago. "New normal" is now one of the most used phrases in our vocabulary. Most of us have adapted remarkably well to new ways, and no doubt there are more adaptations to come. These adaptations would also relate to social interactions and our fast-changing society. Disruptors, or radicals, will lead the way in creating new and accepted ways of doing things which better meet the needs of society.

Jesus was a disruptor and radical who was the author of amazing religious and social change during a time of ferment in Israel. Another disruptor was John Wesley, the father of Methodism and the leader of the reformation of the church in England. As Bishop Dr Chong Chin Chung wrote in the recent *Methodist Message*: "John Wesley realised the need for breakthroughs in the traditional and conservative methods of church shepherding, and that 'new wine must be put into new wineskins' (see Matthew 9: 14 - 17). Wesley's life is 'a story of adapting structures to serve the burgeoning revival movement.' His changes were radical at the time but are now considered very mainstream."

We encourage the disruptors in our school community to embrace innovation, be it local, regional or global, to create better living conditions, better ways of interacting, and greater tolerance and acceptance of differences. New wine needs new wineskins. On a smaller scale, at school we too are looking at how to adapt and better meet the needs of our students in the coming months and years. Please continue to pray for us as we prepare for 2021.

This is the second-to-last newsletter of the year. The last will be published at the end of term in two weeks' time and among other items it will contain name of prize winners, important dates for next year, an acknowledgement of leaving staff and other general information. Our Year 4 and 6 students are currently sitting their external IGCSE and IBDP examinations respectively. We continue to wish them well in their endeavours. The rest of the school has now completed their end-of-year internal examinations with teachers currently returning scripts, and giving follow-up lessons.

This year's Year 6 Graduation and whole-school Speech Day prize-giving ceremonies will be held in the Oldham Chapel but unfortunately due to COVID-19 and the mandatory compliance of the safe management measures, we are not able to invite parents, nor the wider staff. The ceremonies will be live streamed on Facebook though which will enable parents and other supporters the chance to share in the celebrations. See elsewhere in this newsletter for further details.

STAFF NEWS

Music Teacher Shares Practices and Pedagogies

The Ministry of Education's Singapore Teachers' Academy for the Arts (STAR) featured our music teacher, Mr Philip Tan, in three videos on the MOE music teacher network, Musicators!, illuminating artistic practices and pedagogy of electronic music teaching. Musicators! is a closed Facebook group with more than 930 members that offers music teachers a platform to share resources, discuss teaching experiences, and provide professional support for one another.

These videos are additional resources for primary up to 'A' Level teachers who are teaching Music NT, 'O' and 'A' Level syllabuses. The videos feature authentic artistic processes harnessing technology, with the aims to challenge the users in thinking how music compositions can be approached, to learn creative music-making strategies with technology and to encourage innovations in pedagogical approaches towards Electronic Music Composition.

Mr Tan was also invited to conduct sessions in September and October for MOE teachers as part of their ICT professional development. The workshops were very well-received by the participants. He provided critique and expanded their electronic music compositions, and discussed the pedagogical suggestions that teachers could consider for their lessons. Mr Tan demystified the creative and teaching Electronic music processes which have helped teachers understand the use of possible techniques in electronic music compositions for the context of classroom and industry music practices.

Dr Chua Siew Ling, the organiser of the videos and workshops, commented that Mr Tan's contributions have made a positive impact in opening minds and giving insights into the creative processes. The participants left the workshops with rich reflections, and appreciated how they could express themselves creatively.



Green Fingers at Work

On 16 October, we were delighted to hold our very first workshop event at Green Roof. Joined by 20 staff and one parent who were enthusiastic to develop their green fingers, the workshop was kicked off by Mr Burrough's speech which shared our hope for the space to develop into a green hub that supports a wide range of projects.

Ms Joanne Phang, National Parks Board, introduced the various plants and leaves to us followed by the steps to germinate seeds and propagate plants. When it was time to get off their seats, our colleagues simply couldn't wait to get their hands soiled. Whenever possible, Ms Phang would take questions about gardening and generously shared with us her knowledge on how to keep plants healthy. The workshop ended with us putting Sisso Spinach and Indian Borage into the garden's planter, to grow strong and healthily. It is our hope that many more such occasions will be held on this space.

Formal External Examinations

Year 4 and Year 6 subject teachers will be available for consultation with students during their regular subject timetabled times, and at other times by arrangement.

End-of-Year Activity Days: 11 & 12 November

Following the end-of-year examinations for students in Years 1 to 3, Foundation IB and Pre IB, there is usually a time for activity, relationship-building and learning beyond the curriculum; a large part of which had been fulfilled by end-of-year camps in previous years. With overseas travel and domestic activity restrictions in place this year, students will instead have a chance to take part in collaborative, interactive and competitive experiences in school, whilst extending their learning from both the pastoral programme and subject specific curricula, through the End-of-Year Activity Days on Wednesday, 11 November, and Thursday, 12 November.

Working with their House tutor group, students will be involved in a variety of challenges across a selection of faculty areas related to the *UN Global Goals*, which provide a blueprint to achieve a better and more sustainable future for all. House tutor groups within the same year group will compete against one another to complete the challenges, with an overall winning House tutor group to be crowned and prizes to be awarded to each year group.

Students will be required to be in school from 8:00am to 3:00pm on both days, yet normal lesson timings will be different. The timetable of activities will be shared with students by their House tutor. Students can wear their PE uniform on the day they have PE lesson and their House T-shirt with regular pants/culottes on the other day.

International Student Insurance

It is compulsory for international students (on Student Pass) to purchase the school's required insurance. The school will continue to engage the services of Honan Insurance in 2021. The payment for the insurance (SGD\$300) will be billed to the international student's 2021 school fees payment. Students with non-Honan insurance policy are advised not to renew their existing policy if it is expiring, as each international student is required to purchase a local insurance policy as required by the school.

Year 6 IB Results Release: An Update

The results of the November IB Diploma examinations will now be released online to students at 2:00pm, Sunday, 3 January 2021. Year 5 anticipated results will also be released online at the same time. (This is a change to the timeline previously advised by the IBO and printed in the October newsletter.)

A hardcopy of the student's result slip will be released in the Library on Monday, 4 January 2021, at 3:30pm. The school will share the cohort's statistics and top performers; plus be available for counselling/queries, etc. Thereafter, students may wish to collect it from the General Office from 9:00am to 5:00pm on weekdays.

Year 5 IBDP

The start date for our own Year 5 students who qualified for entry via DSA (based on their Year 4 preliminary examination results at the end of Term 3 in 2020) and 2020 Pre IB and Foundation IB students who qualified, will be Thursday, 7 January 2021. Singapore Mathematical Olympiad 2020

Despite school closure during the circuit breaker period whereby we had limited access to resources and space for our art-making, we managed to meet the examination requirements to curate an exhibition of 8 to 11 art works for Higher Level students, and 4 to 7 for Standard Level students. This had been a challenge for some schools but we made up for the lost time because our teacher, Mr Talbot opened the Art department from Monday to Friday during the two-week September holidays for us.

Throughout the journey, we experimented with and developed various new artistic skills in media such as painting, photography, screen printing, sculpture and installation. A huge amount of commitment, time and effort had been invested in the creative process. The art works included paintings of various styles from realism to abstraction; creative use of materials such as emulsion lifts of polaroid photographs; and three-dimensional works made from different materials such as light bulbs, acrylic sheets, film montages, and pacifiers.

Each of us is proud of our achievement. We would like to thank staff, family and friends, some of whom managed to view the exhibition, for their support. Lastly, we would like to express our sincere gratitude to our Visual Arts teacher, Mr Talbot, for guiding and supporting us with feedback and advice on our artistic development.

Exhibition "Conflict" by Foundation IB Students

In response to Lebanese artist Mona Hatoum and her artwork *Hotspot*, our class made installations relating to the topic "Conflict" to convey our views on conflicts, wars, or political issues that are happening all over the world.

There were a total of six projects undertaken in groups of 2 or 3:

Trump Tower: A structure built from playing cards and wooden sticks, with news headlines about the Trump presidency. This work challenged the viewers to contemplate the delicate balance between the truth and the lies that Trump might have spread throughout his presidency. The house of cards, a metaphor for the frailty of his power, was built on a "base" of deception.

0001: A model of a corpse made with newspapers and covered with red paint. One of its arms was missing as it laid lifeless on the floor. It represented the literal consequences of conflict, where many suffered injuries and died, often only being remembered as statistics.

Scope: A model rifle built from chopsticks, and aimed to draw light on the armaments used in battles.


Stalemate: This project depicted the ongoing conflict between capitalism and communism with cardboard soldiers arranged across a chessboard. It examined the consequences when two ideologies clash, resulting in losses for both sides and eventual stalemate.

Faith and Execution: A collection of photographs about terrorism and the cost such actions brought to lives, particularly on civilians caught in the crossfire.

Behind the Light: An artwork made from wire shaped into a map of the world. It represented the widespread occurrence of conflict around the globe by illuminating a silhouette of the world onto news articles, and shining a metaphorical light onto conflict.

Through the project, we were introduced to a few media and techniques which enabled us to express our intentions and concerns on the issues of world conflict. We also learnt about the various forms of conflict and disputes in which we have chosen to research on, and how to creatively convey our ideas. Being exposed to past and present conflicts from around the globe, and learning from them, will hopefully help us become better global citizens in the future.


A Mini-Recital by Year 3 Music Students
