IB Virtual Conference, Asia-Pacific 2021

Five teaching staff attended the IB Virtual Conference Asia-Pacific held from 21 to 23 April, with the theme *Unlocking the Next Paradigm in Education*. They attended keynote speeches and breakout sessions which examined how the future of education is being shaped by new perspectives, approaches and attitudes.

Here are some learning points from three participants from our school:

On the whole, I find the IB Virtual Conference insightful and the following three talks especially engaging:

- Unlocking Climate and Culture by Steven Bollar
- ATL Skills and Leadership by Lance King
- Bridging the Gap Between Students and Educators by Jeff Butler

They all pointed at the reality that our students are facing — being highly exposed to the digital world with its pros and cons, and how we as educators and school leaders can address that. From the conference, I find new energies and strategies to bring back to class which is a very important takeaway.

It is critical to impart communication skills in the classroom that enable learners to become effective international communicators using the ADAPT model:

- A Awareness of own beliefs, perspectives and attitudes;
 D Don't judge;
- A Analyse things from different perspectives;
- P Persuade yourself to align your attitudes to that of others;
- T Try to adapt and accommodate your behaviour.

Teachers must be a guide to students, promote effective use of technology and encourage innovation in the regular classroom.

Research has shown that there is positive correlation between note taking and learning outcomes of students.

The future (of learning and teaching) is hybrid. There will be a continuous search to find the sweet spot which will be different for different students, subjects and/or schools/communities.

My key takeaways are the use of:

- the "Daytime radio voice" when administering positive reinforcement; and
- the "Nighttime radio voice" when administering stern warnings/reprimands.





School Drop Off and Pick Up – Road Rules

In order to be considerate to our neighbours who live in Jalan Hitam Manis and Jalan Puteh Jerneh, we advise parents and drivers to adhere to the following:

- Turn off your engines when waiting to pick up your child from school. With many cars waiting outside the school, the noise of car engines can be quite disturbing to the residents.
- Drive at a safe speed that is below the legal speed limit along the roads near school. The pavements are narrow and often blocked which results in pedestrians, including young children, having to walk on the road. Drivers should be mindful of this and reduce their speed.
- Reduce speed when it is raining in order not to spray puddles of water at students and members of the public who are walking close by.
- Refrain from waiting/parking illegally. It is an offence to park/wait on either side of a road demarcated by a continuous white line or double yellow lines.
- Please do not beep your horn to get your child's attention; this is a noise nuisance to our neighbours.
- Plan your pick-up time with your child to reduce the queuing/waiting time along the road.
- Avoid arriving earlier than the scheduled school dismissal time.
- Do not park in front of the access of any residential unit.
- Be considerate and allow cars from side roads access into the car queue waiting to exit to Holland Village.
- Parents are encouraged to make use of the back gate (Gate C) via Holland Close as a much less congested alternative to drop off your child (see below map for details).

We appreciate your support in this matter as we work with those who live around us to provide a safe and enjoyable environment.

Student Community Projects Exhibited at IB Virtual Conference, Asia-Pacific 2021

Student projects by Sustainability CCA and Interact Club CCA were accepted into Community Projects showcase at the IB Virtual Conference, Asia-Pacific 2021, in April. The organisers merged the two projects into one with the title "A Decade of Community Outreach and Sustainable Garden". This is a glowing tribute to and recognition of the good works of our students and teachers.

Sustainability CCA Showcases Sustainable Garden





Gardens have many functions; they give us social space and green space. We wanted our garden to provide our school community with opportunities to grow plants and also provide a place to enhance well-being.

Establishing a sustainable garden was essential. After careful planning and sourcing recycled materials, our garden was born in Term 4 of 2019. The initial idea came from a middle school student who wanted to provide hands-on activities for his friends during lunch breaks. Using gardening skills taught by his grandmother and with his passion for gardening, he wrote a plan for a garden and presented it to the Principal. The gardening group was born and incorporated into the Sustainability Co-Curricular Activity (CCA), modelled using <u>Sustainability Compass Education</u>. Students were eager to join the CCA to learn new skills and to occupy their lunch breaks.

The COVID-19 pandemic has caused a number of mental health issues. After coming out of lockdown in June 2020, our school became a refuge, particularly the garden area. All plants are cultivated from mother plants or from seeds. Pots and tools are recycled and our soil is made from compost.

Students, along with teachers are pruning, weeding and just relaxing among the plants. Even maintenance staff begin to share their skills. We are now collaborating with National Parks Board to grow rainforest trees which will eventually be planted in Singapore. We want our garden to be sustainable and also a place that unites our school community.

One challenge that students face is learning how to grow plants in the tropics. They have to research how best to care for plants. Students are continually looking for ways to improve the garden which keeps them active and interested in utilising urban spaces for a sustainable future. The competition comprised a virtual completion of two 45-minute papers, supervised by Ms Linda Low. The first paper contained many questions about all the aspects of biology. The second paper contained longer problems. Students were presented with unfamiliar ideas and topics and would have to use problem-solving skills, biological intuition and logic.

Sustainability CCA: Changing Mindsets

An update on what the various sub-groups are doing...

Energy Conservation Group: To recognise Earth Day this year, a group of Year 5 students prepared a video and resources for the Junior Pastoral Programme. Junior students watched a captivating video about how our planet is changing and what we can do about it. Students were given time to discuss the key ideas and also asked to create an energy conservation mascot design. The winning designs will be made into stickers for display in our classrooms. Winners will be announced at assembly on 19 May.

The Year 5 team also prepared daily challenges for the junior students to get them to participate in a more sustainable lifestyle.

Day One Challenge was: Using the blue/pink recycle bins in school! Every day, we have a lot of waste such as plastic, cans and paper but we do not recycle everything we can. It is really easy to do: wash cans and plastics that contain food and throw them away in the blue bins located in or near the canteen. If there is any paper that you want to throw away, place them in the pink bins located in every classroom. These small actions we can do in our daily life are one of the main things that will lead us to a greener earth!

The Year 5 students comprise Sanya (5 Thoburn), Bernice (5 Thoburn), Minjee (5 CKS), Chong Yu (Donovan) (5 LSG), Pongyada (5 Oldham) and Yeonje (Sally) (5 SVM).

Single Use Plastics Group: Over the last term, Year 5 students have been selling metals straw sets, cutlery sets and tumblers to help students reduce waste in the canteen by reusing their own utensils. All stock is nearly sold out. This is fantastic, as it illustrates students want to do more to sustain their future. The students who organised, advertised and sold the items are Yixuan (1 TCT), Rain (5 TKK), Saya (5 Thoburn), Aiko (5 Oldham) and Yuiko (5 Oldham). These students also made the time to clean up plastics at Pasir Ris Beach by collaborating with a non-government organisation (NGO), Kindred Community.

Clothing/Spectacles/Sport Equipment Donations Group: For the past two years, students have been recycling clothing and sport equipment to local NGOs such as Rainbow Centre, Soles For Souls and the Salvation Army. These organisations are grateful for the repurposed goods which help support their programmes. This year, we are adding spectacles to our donations. We are accepting donations of old, used and even broken prescription eye glasses. The spectacles will be repaired, cleaned and distributed by the NGO the students are collaborating with. Interact Club CAS Projects

It has been a very busy month for us at Interact Club as we roll out various CAS Projects. Here are the highlights from two of our projects.

Charms for Cancer Project

Raising funds for the Children's Cancer Foundation (CCF), our students launched a school-wide "Charms for Cancer" campaign, encouraging students and staff to order hand-made, personalised charms and bracelets, with proceeds raised going towards supporting the children in CCF. Response was very positive and our Interactors managed to raise close to \$1,000 from their heart-felt and meaningful campaign.







Project Tetrapak

As part of our environmental conservation efforts, our Interactors also embarked on a sustainability project with Tetrapak Singapore. A school-wide publicity campaign (educational video and posters) was launched to educate students and staff about the 4-step process to recycle their used Tetrapaks (e.g. Milo and milk packets) in the Tetrapak bins placed around the school.

The campaign has received positive response so far, with about 3kg worth of Tetrapaks collected from our very first collection in the canteen. We are looking forward to an even greater haul from our biweekly collections.


