IGCSE 2020 Examination Results

ACS (International) students in the November 2020 IGCSE examination scored a 98% pass rate, the school's best result to date. Distinction passes (A and A*) were our highest ever at 71.6%.

Top performing subjects included International Mathematics, Mandarin Chinese, Spanish, Geography, English Literature, Music and Drama with 100% pass rates. The highest percentage of distinctions were in Mandarin Chinese (100%), Music (100%), English Literature (90.9%), Chemistry (83.6%), Additional Mathematics (79.8%%), International Mathematics (77.8%), Economics (79.5%) Business Studies (73.5%) and Biology (70.7%).

Top in the World results will be released later in the year. The school has gained 20 of these prestigious awards over the previous 10 years in English Literature, English Language, Economics, Mathematics, Additional Mathematics, Geography, Physical Education and Chinese. We anticipate to pick up at least one Top In the World in International Mathematics as one student scored a perfect 100% in the examination.

We congratulate both students and staff on the high quality IGCSE results during a difficult situation brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Singapore Cultural Orientation 1: An Indoor Activity

The Singapore Cultural Orientation 1 was held on Friday, 29 January, 3:15–5:45pm, organised by the International Student Committee. More than 62 students of eight different nationalities attended the event; 21 students from China, 7 Hong Kong, 4 Japan, 2 Indonesia, 21 Korea, 3 Malaysia, 1 Taiwan and 3 Thailand.

The orientation was organised with the objective for the new international students to get to know Singapore better, and make friends with other fellow international students.

During the event, students listened to a presentation about how to get around Singapore, took part in ice-breaker activities led by the International Students Committee with the aim to get to know each other better, enjoyed pizza and snacks while they mingled and played games at four different stations namely Station 1: Chinatown, Station 2: Little India, Station 3: Kampong Gelam and Station 4: Pictionary. They were grouped according to their nationalities so that it would be easier for them to communicate with each other.

The International Student Committee prepared Kahoot quizzes and games after playing the video that highlight the significant landmarks in Singapore, found in Chinatown, Little India and Kampong Gelam. Groups were set to compete against each other.

Overall, the event is a success with the new students knowing more about Singapore and meeting new school mates whom they will enjoy school life together. The International Student Committee was also contented with organising the event and look forward to planning more similar events in the future.

Geography Trip to Kampong Gelam

On 22 January, Geography students and teachers went on a trip to Kampong Gelam, a heritage site in Singapore. The purpose of the trip was to collect fieldwork data as part of our IGCSE Coursework component. The geographical study focused on the rejuvenation efforts in Kampong Gelam and whether these efforts were successful in retaining the heritage aspect of the ethnic enclave.

We worked in groups of six, with each group collecting data from one transect in Kampong Gelam. A total of seven transects were sampled. Our data collection tasks included mapping the land use on each transect, conducting pedestrian flow counts and surveys through questionnaires.

This fieldwork was indeed an eye-opener. Being physically in Kampong Gelam gave us a better feel and idea of the geographical context in terms of the atmosphere and ambience. This was definitely more helpful than referring to pictures and articles on Kampong Gelam. We also got to explore a very different cultural landscape in Singapore – we saw several textile shops, the unique architecture, and the art murals in Haji Lane. The data collection was challenging, especially conducting questionnaires. Most of the shop owners were unwilling to participate as they felt that we were disrupting their businesses. They only agreed after much persuasion. Fortunately, most of the visitors were quite agreeable to answering our surveys as they could easily access it using a QR code. We learned to step out of our comfort zone to approach strangers and to explain to them our purpose. All in all, the trip was not only a great learning experience but also very meaningful.

How did the school prepare you for IGCSE and for IBDP?

For four years, ACS (International) provided me with a lot of opportunities for holistic education through my CCAs (Netball, Badminton, Frisbee and Interact Club) which helped relieve stress and open career paths for my future endeavours.

I was blessed with wonderful teachers such as Ms Kom, Ms Low and Mdm Ong who continually supported me. My Housemaster Mr Rajan and House Tutor Mr Alastair also provided a strong emotional support system which helped motivate me. My mentor of the High Achiever scheme Mrs Tan constantly looked out for me. I could share my problems and worries with her, and it made me feel better as we would think of solutions/ways to improve. I was given a great deal of independence and space to explore methods that fit me.

Tell us about your IB journey. What were the ups and downs? What did you do to keep the ups going? How did you overcome the downs?

The IB journey will forever be one to remember. The ups included the opportunity to serve the school as CKS House Captain and plan events to boost the House spirit. Although doing well academically was a priority, these two years were more about developing maturity and a proactive attitude. As a leader, I could interact and empathise more with others by listening to their needs and making quick decisions. These challenges helped me develop time management skills and self-discipline, all of which were necessary to meet the deadlines of IAs.

I thoroughly enjoyed myself. I helped host many charity events, went on CAS trips and learned about the world. The constant opportunity to critically think about problems in the world and incorporate my areas of interest into my studies gave me motivation to persevere and keep going.

The downs were my initial self-doubt and lack of confidence in my work. I felt pressured to do better and was concerned about not reaching my full potential. I also struggled to accept that my good results throughout the two years were of my own effort. I consulted my teachers who advised me to focus on my strengths and give myself the credit I deserve. 2020 was a year of unprecedented firsts. How was it like for you managing the abrupt changes to school life such as doing HBL and observing safe distancing and enhanced hygiene levels, while juggling the IB course, family and leisure?

Initially, COVID-19 was a huge inconvenience to the sports CCAs I participated in, as well Inter-House events. The circuit breaker period made it difficult for me to participate in any activities and I had difficulties adjusting. However, it provided me with an opportunity to stay self-motivated and time to improve my weaker subjects. Since IB is all about self-discipline, HBL gave me time to experiment study methods, e.g. I stopped using notes but focused on applying concepts learnt through past papers and flashcards. I also used study apps like Forest and Taskade to remove distractions and complete checklists.

I kept myself happy by playing online games with friends at night, spending time with family and also exercising regularly. By completing work in the day and playing at night, I could maintain a balanced lifestyle.

In three single adjectives or phrases, describe the school and elaborate on each of them.

Opportunities – Students are given a chance to develop their interests all year round. Career talks by universities or alumni, MUN conferences, art competitions or debates help us find out about our interests and passions. I was able to participate in many academic olympiads and the pre-university seminar which helped broaden my knowledge and perspective of various subjects. We can also participate in Inter-House sports competitions and slowly work towards being part of the school team.

Flexible – The school offers a wide range of subjects for both IGCSE and IBDP. Many of my peers enjoyed studying psychology and business management which are not offered in other schools. I was also not limited to learning in a certain way – the school provided me with enough personal space to learn more about myself and become more independent.

Character Growth – I entered the school as a quiet person with no confidence. The warm welcome by teachers and students helped me speak up and engage. This instilled a sense of proactiveness as I started to ask questions in classes, approach teachers to clarify my doubts, and participate in Inter-House events all year round. The small cohort size also made it easier to know everyone and the freedom to try new sports.

Any advice for your juniors especially the Year 6 students?

For Year 6s, try to make the most of this year and have fun! Besides studying, I made sure I had a social life as well. I was able to forge friendships which I will always cherish.

I have learnt that procrastination stems from our fear of certain emotions, e.g. a fear of failure may prevent us from finishing certain assignments. This can be curbed by accepting your own fears and finding interest in the subject you study. My passion to study medicine motivated me to study the medicinal effects of Chinese herbs for my Biology IA, and my keen interest in environmental sustainability led to my research on removing heavy metals from rivers for my Chemistry IA.

Use the IB journey to incorporate and develop your interests so that the work you produce for IB represents who you are as an individual and you will be able to take pride in your work. Manage your time well so that you can work hard and play hard too. Participate in school events and opportunities, because these experiences will make up your high school life. Do things you never thought you could do, for these experiences will take you to places. Also, ensure you devise ways to release stress. IB may be demanding, but the two years will be manageable if you plan your schedule and set aside sufficient rest and revision time.

Can you share with us your plan for the near future?

My dream is to become a medical doctor who works in third world countries. I will apply to medical school and hope to specialise in emergency medicine and infectious diseases. Meanwhile, I will continue volunteering in Singapore in various community services.
