Dear Parents, Students and Friends

Welcome to the start of a new academic year. The staff of ACS (International) are excited about the new school year and to welcome back our students as they commence another year of study. To our new families, I would like to extend a special welcome. I hope that your child has enjoyed their first week at school, settled in and made some friends.

At this time, it is important to acknowledge families in our school community who endured separation from their child last year due to the pandemic. For many of our students, the end-of-year break provided them with an opportunity to see family and friends whom they were separated from. I trust that this time at home was special and that everyone made the most of their time together. I pray that in 2021 we see COVID-19 tamed and an end to the separation and uncertainty the virus has brought to all of our lives.

ACS (International) congratulates the Graduating Class of 2020 on their outstanding IBDP results. The results serve as a testimony to our students' tenacity as they rose to the challenges of 2020. The cohort had a 99% pass rate and achieved an average score of 35.7 points which is expected to rise after re-marks are complete. 92% of our students achieved scores over the IB world average of 29.8 points, with 20% gaining a score of over 40 points. We are particularly proud of Ren Yiting who achieved a perfect score of 45 points.

The school leadership offers its thanks and appreciation to all the staff of ACS (International) for the dedication and hard work they have put into nurturing the graduating students of 2020.

In our virtual Commencement Assembly 2021, I took the opportunity to speak to our students about the vision we have for them as they continue their education:

ACS (International) develops future leaders with an international vision, moral character, intellectual ability, and a deep compassion for humanity based upon Christian belief and values.

These are the attributes that we look to invest in the students at our school. Our young people should be inquirers, thinkers and knowledgeable as they apply themselves to their studies; caring, principled and reflective as they apply themselves to others; and risk-takers, communicators and open-minded as they apply themselves to the world.

There will no doubt be challenges in 2021 but we live with the knowledge that the Lord our God is with us and we can bring all things to Him in prayer. In Joshua 1:9, God tells Joshua to be strong and courageous, and not to be afraid or discouraged as the Lord God is with him wherever he goes. This is just as true for us today as it was for Joshua. IBDP Examination 2020 Results: Second 45 Pointer After Re-mark

The staff of ACS (International) are pleased to share an update of 2020 International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme (IBDP) results with the school community.

For the fifth year out of the last six, ACS (International) students achieve the perfect score of 45 points in the IBDP examination results. This year, we are proud to announce we have two perfect scorers in the 2020 IBDP examinations, the second after the re-mark was completed.

Ren Yiting is a Chinese national who joined ACS (International) in January 2016. She completed the International General Certificate of Secondary Education (IGCSE) offered by Cambridge Assessment International Education in 2018, achieving outstanding results. Yiting went on to study the IBDP in 2019, and was appointed as a School Prefect and served in Ambassadors sub-committee from 2019 to 2020. She was also actively engaged in co-curricular activities and had served the school and wider community.

Hannah Kek Yihui is a Singaporean who joined the school in January 2017. She completed the IGCSE offered by Cambridge Assessment International Education in 2018 with outstanding results before pursuing the IBDP in 2019. She was appointed Student Head of House for CKS House and a School Prefect from 2019 to 2020. Hannah was active in sports and other co-curricular, and had served the school and wider community with passion and distinction during her 4 years with the school.

92% of students scored above the world average of 29.81 points which is our best result in recent years, exceeding last year's 91%. The overall pass rate was 99.4%. One student did not pass as they unfortunately scored less than 12 points in their three Higher Level subjects.

The average score of 35.7 points was a slight improvement from last year's 35.3 points, but this is expected to top to 36 points when recounts and successful appeals are factored in.

As usual, a significant number of our students passed the IB Diploma with English as their second language. This is particularly impressive as students firstly have to learn English, then think in English then write in an English academic style. Research usually suggests that it takes 7 years to become fully proficient in a second language, and most of these students achieved this in 3 to 6 years.

Five students among the 2020 class were accepted to the IBDP programme with 'O' level L1R5 scores of 23–25 and scored an average of 32.5 points. One student entered the school on an L1R5 score of 24 and achieved an IB score of 38 points. Another example of significant value add is a student who entered the school with a PSLE score of 183 and achieved an IB score of 39 points. While there are similar stories to this in the 2020 results, these two examples highlight the exceptional value add that students can get at ACS (International). These students now have many university options.

ACS (International) extends its congratulations to the students for all they have achieved, particularly given all the disruptions caused by COVID-19 in 2020. The SLT offers its thanks and appreciation to all the staff of ACS (International) for the hard work they have put into nurturing these students during their time with our school.

We are grateful for the way that our staff and students rose to all the challenges that COVID-19 brought in 2020.

Staff Professional Development Days

Our staff returned for the new academic year on Monday, 4 January, after a well-deserved rest. We welcomed new staff to our school community and congratulated those who return this year to positions of leadership.

Day 1

In the first staff session, we spent time looking at our school's Guiding Statements and Strategic Goals for 2021 so that from the onset, all staff are clear about what we are looking to achieve in 2021. The academic staff also met together in House teams to share thoughts, feelings and ideas about the year ahead using an approach called Community Building Circles.

The second staff session involved all staff reflecting on the school improvement process we have undergone for the past 18 months, which is being guided by the Council for International Schools. The staff reflected on all the tasks they have carried out and how these can be used for continual school improvement in 2021 and beyond.

Day 2

The academic staff attended an in-house Professional Development workshop, "Integrating TOK Into Subjects", led by the TOK Coordinator, Mr Christopher Bossan.

Theory of Knowledge (TOK) is part of the IBDP Core, and the course focuses on critical exploration on the nature of knowledge and process of knowing. The objective of the workshop was to equip all teachers to integrate TOK into their subjects in order to enrich and deepen discussions in the subject and across subjects, develop independent and critical thinking, and foster international mindedness by recognising diversity of perspectives.

Teachers were actively engaged in sharing and learning from one another during the breakout sessions. Finally, they collaboratively planned a TOK activity for their respective subjects.

The workshop has informed and inspired our teaching faculty to intentionally make connections to TOK in their classrooms.

Day 3

The academic staff received an in-service training on our CCA platform (SchoolsBuddy) and all staff attended our annual Child Safeguarding and Protection training. Houses and Faculties next met to finalise their plans prior to the commencement of school.

One Million Trees Planting Project

The One Million Trees Movement is a nationwide effort coordinated by the National Parks Board, to plant one million trees across Singapore by 2030. Through the movement, all members of the community have the opportunity to be involved in improving our urban environment and transforming Singapore by restoring nature back into the city, as well as contributing to the global effort to tackle climate change. Trees serve as natural air filters, providing us with clean air and help to enhance the physical, mental and social aspects of community well-being.

On Saturday, 12 December 2020, together with 29 fellow National Youth Achievement Award participants including the Sustainability CCA's Gardening Group, I (see photo in top row, left, in blue T shirt) gained the opportunity to be involved in this project.

We arrived at Telok Blangah Hill Park well-prepared, after receiving instructions on appropriate dress code and instructional videos on tree planting. Our first task was to dig into the soil to create space for the tree (we wanted to plant), before rolling it into the hole, and covering the spaces with loose soil. Sounds easy enough until we were told that the tree base was approximately 1m by 1m and the tree was 3m high! We finished our newly planted tree with a scattering of dead leaves and a much-needed watering. I certainly did not know that dead leaves could be recycled in such a way!

Even though it was physically tolling, I enjoyed the sight of many trees being planted by our school representatives. I knew that this was to contribute to the environment and the society. In total, 30 ACS (International) students planted 63 trees in one morning!

It is through participating in projects such as this that I will become a more socially responsible citizen who understands the issues faced by the community and find ways to contribute actively to find a solution. Sustainability CCA – Gardening Group

During the 2020 December holidays, the Sustainability CCA was kept busy.

The Clothing & Sport Equipment Donation Group prepared boxes of goods to donate to local charities just in time for the holiday season. Group members had to clean all the equipment donated by the PE Department and to call numerous charities to arrange for collection.

The Gardening Group met up for a few days to work in the garden. As we have a few different plants like chillies and aloe vera, we had to make sure they had enough water and to check the weeds were not taking over! We also cultivated some herbs and spices. We will sell some of our plants to raise money to purchase soil and tools, plus we want to make a donation to "Stay United" (https://www.sgunited.gov.sg/stay-united/).

To improve access to our garden, we landscaped a walkway for school members to enter the garden without trampling on the plants. We had to first prepare and level the ground, then measure the space for the cement tiles to ensure the tiles were lined perfectly. As a group, we managed to lift the heavy tiles and lay them on the ground. It was hard work but we completed the work under the guidance of Ms Jackson. Learning how to grow plants and care for a garden are skills we can use in life. Working together to manage spaces and reuse things instead of always buying new ones is also an important skill.

Through gardening, students can develop new skills, understand and evolve a love for plants. There is also a sense of satisfaction caring for something you have planted and learning more about different plants. Gardening is very hands-on and is a great pastime for anyone who wants to keep busy at lunch time or after school dismissal. It is also a great way to make new friends and relieve stress. You don't need to be good at gardening; you gain experience the more you get involved.

Catching Up with Ren Yiting

The results of the November 2020 IB Diploma examinations were released online to students on Sunday, 3 January, unlike previous years when students would come to school to receive their hardcopy result slip and could only access their results online later in the same day. By the time the 2020 cohort arrived at the Oldham Chapel on Monday, 4 January, 3:30pm, to collect their result slip, close friends of Ren Yiting (former 6 TKK) already knew that she was the fifth 45 pointer of ACS (International), of which the first was from the 2015 cohort.

We caught up with the school's perfect scorer who agreed to an email interview with the Communications Department. Read on to know more about Yiting.

You joined ACS (International) in 2016 as a Pre IGCSE (Bridging) student. How did the school prepare you for IGCSE and for IBDP?

The support from my teachers played a big role in both my IGCSE and IBDP journey. They enlightened my passion for studies, instead of just saying that the grades were important. For example, my Mathematics teacher, Mr Raghu's faith and courage changed my attitude towards Mathematics and boosted my enthusiasm. In the last four years, my teachers always surprised me with different ways of thinking and learning. They always encouraged instead of criticising me when I made mistakes. They not only cared about my academic achievements, but also my physical and psychological conditions.

Tell us about your IB journey. What were the ups and downs? What did you do to keep the ups going? How did you overcome the downs?

I think the ups could be scoring high in common tests or endof-year examinations, but it's extremely difficult to retain the high academic performance throughout the year. To be honest, I was not the best student in the last two years, but I tried my best to make sure I'm always in the top list. I balanced the time spent on revising each subject to ensure that I would perform equally. I did my individual notes for each subject, which was very helpful for me to understand the concepts.

Consequently, the downs would be some slip-ups in the tests. As a perfectionist, I couldn't tolerate the mistakes I made, so sometimes I would become emotional due to my academic performance. To overcome this, I would improve my mood first and try to think about the methods to improve my understanding of the concepts (of the subject in question) rather than just focus on the disappointment. I would go through the questions I answered incorrectly and find out what mistakes I had made. I also re-allocated more time on this subject and understand the concepts instead of memorising them.

2020 was a year of unprecedented firsts. How was it like for you managing the abrupt changes to school life such as doing HBL and observing safe distancing and enhanced hygiene levels, while juggling the IB course, family and leisure?

2020 was indeed a black swan that no one could expect. Most people felt HBL disrupted the regular school life, but I think HBL gave me a great opportunity to focus on my studies and myself. I set my own timetable during HBL and strictly followed it. I like the HBL period because I don't have to travel to school and I could use the travelling time to exercise and improve my IAs.

Unlike most of the people, I think doing HBL really improved my self-management and time management skills. Throughout the year, my family gave me 100% support and they created a quiet environment for me to study although they had to work at home during the circuit breaker period as well. My mother eased my anxiety and pressure from the upcoming examinations by doing most of the house chores so that I could focus 100% on my studies.

As for leisure, I barely had any social life in the last two years. The leisure I had was engaging in social media and staying in touch with my best friend, Anna Zheng. She always comforts me when I'm feeling less confident and is the one who has brought me endless joy in the past last two years.

In three single adjectives or phrases, describe the school and elaborate on each of them.

I guess these would be joyful, big family and meaningful.

Joyful – I met many amazing people in ACS (International) and I do remember a lot of comical memories. They created a joyful environment for everyone and this took away the stress on my studies.

Big Family – After joining the 15th Prefectorial Board (Ambassadors), I have learnt to organise events successfully and deal with last-minute changes. My team and I helped each other when we faced difficult issues, like a big family caring for each other.

Meaningful – I had travelled to many countries with the school in the last five years, including Malaysia, the United Kingdom, Japan and Zimbabwe. The most memorable trip for me was my CAS trip to Zimbabwe. We visited local schools and their living conditions, observed the beautiful sky with thousands of stars, and walked with lions in the morning. We even tried the bungee jumping at Victoria Falls. I will etch these memories on my heart.

Any advice for your juniors, especially the Year 6 students?

Be self-disciplined, no matter what happened. DO NOT PROCRASTINATE! Finish your IAs, EE and TOK as early as possible. Set yourself simple and realistic goals such as "complete Economics Chapter 3 notes" instead of "read Economics textbook". For juniors who dislike their subjects, my advice is, don't lose your interest in the subjects you have performed badly just because of your scores. Try to foster your passion in the subjects you have chosen, and this will make the journey in your studies easier.

Understand that varsity is next. Can you share with us your future plans, like subject of study and potential career?

As I mentioned earlier, Mr Raghu has ignited my passion in Mathematics. I will continue to study Mathematics at university, with the plan to pursue a master's degree in Big Data or Finance.
