The Christian Fellowship CCA held a special end-of-term meeting on 12 March with a birthday celebration for the January to March birthday folks and a guest speaker, Dr Darren Chua.



Here's what two students said about the meeting:

Dr Darren Chua, a former ACS boy, had his whole life ahead of him as a neurosurgeon. Just days before starting his housemanship, he suffered a stroke, losing half of his vision and control of the right side of his body. The stroke destroyed many of his hopes and dreams in his life. Life took a toll on him but where is he now?

He is still partially blind, walking unaided but carefully since his right side had never regained full strength back. His accomplishments so far have put the stroke out of the picture: Started an enrichment centre for young students and potential neurosurgeons, founded Mindset Transformation Clinic, bringing home a gold medal in the ASEAN Para Games for Table Tennis. He discovered that, when he partnered with God, the sky's the limit. If there were a song to describe his journey in life, it would be "I'm Still Standing" by Elton John.





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
Parking/Waiting Along Jalan Hitam Manis Outside (ACS International)

ACS (International) have received feedback in recent months about motorists parking along Jalan Hitam Manis and driving at fast speed along Jalan Puteh Jerneh. Such parking of vehicles in the vicinity of the school zone increases the risks for students using the roads. It also causes inconveniences to other road users as well as being illegal.

For the safety of all, we seek the co-operation of all parents driving to school to exercise care and consideration by adhering to the following:

- Refrain from parking/waiting illegally along Jalan Hitam Manis. It is an offence to park/wait on either side of a road demarcated by a continuous white line or double yellow lines;
- Plan your pick-up time with your child to reduce the queuing/waiting time along the road;
- Avoid arriving earlier than the scheduled school's dismissal time;
- Do not park in front of the access of any residential unit; and
- Be considerate and allow cars from side roads access into the car queue waiting to exit to Holland Village.

Parents are encouraged to make use of the back gate (Gate C) via Holland Close as a much less congested alternative to drop off their children (see below map for details).

Projects at Green Roof

At the end of Term 1, Green Roof was proud to see two projects developed and wrapped up with great satisfaction. One was a curriculum project where students learned gardening and Mandarin at the same time. As students learned all about growing vegetables and got their hands dirty, they observed and recorded the growth of the vegetables with new discovery each day.

"So agriculture is reliant on the weather!" and "The farmer has to work very hard so we better not waste food" are examples of such observations. The students recorded their findings are in a <u>padlet</u>. (The names have been changed to protect the privacy of the students.)

Student reflections

From the first week of February, we started the Gardening project of our Chinese class. The aim of this project was to learn the names of vegetables and the processes of how they were grown in Mandarin Chinese. We also had a cooking class during the last lesson of the project.

We were divided into four groups and I was in the Group 3. We went to the rooftop garden and planted the seedlings of pak boh chai and lettuce. I remembered that there were a lot of things that had to be done carefully. After a few weeks, we had to water the plants during every lesson, unlike the earlier weeks. Each time we went to the rooftop garden, all the plants grew surprisingly fast. By the time we harvested them, they became so large that was beyond my expectation. During the last lesson of this project, we made sandwiches and noodles with the vegetables we harvested. For noodles, we used noodles, seasonings and bak boh chai. With the lettuce, we made sandwiches with tomatoes, bread, cheese and ham. Both were very tasty.

When I first heard of this project, I felt very excited as I had not done gardening for so long after primary school. Overall, the vegetables grew healthily and everything was successful. I think this fun experience was one of the most memorable projects in this school.

During this term in Chinese class, we grew vegetables at the rooftop garden and learned Chinese vocabulary related to growing vegetables. In the classroom, we first learned the basic knowledge like how much sunlight and water, and what kind of fertiliser and soil are needed for growing different vegetables. After that, the teacher showed us the seeds that she bought, and taught us how to transfer the seedlings into the soil. The vegetables needed a lot of watering every week. After about 4 to 5 weeks, the vegetables we grew were very large, the leaves were green and tender. Some of the vegetables next to my group were not well watered, hence they withered and died. Seeing how fragile the vegetables were and dying easily, it led me to really appreciate the efforts and labour the farmers put in. It was amazing for me to see the plants grow so fast, but it also reminded me that the happenings in life and in the world we live in pass by quickly, regardless whether you are able to keep up. This experience of growing vegetables has inspired me to spend more time on the important things, otherwise life would lose its meaning.

At the end of the project, we harvested the vegetables, washed them and then use them for making sandwiches and noodles soup.

This term's Chinese class is very interesting, so I hope I can continue to learn Chinese this way.

Also Year 6 students initiated a CAS project. They grew chye sim, brinjal and chilli for a charity project. Upon harvest, they packed the vegetables and partnered Reach Out to go door to door to give out the vegetables to the residents living in one-room rental flats in one of the blocks near school. 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CK Sharks at Willing Hearts

During the March holiday, 22 students and 6 teachers from CKS gathered at Willing Hearts, at 5am!!! Willing Hearts is a secular, non-affiliated charity. 
Learning how to draw properly in one-point and in two-point perspectives were very useful because it helped me get a better understanding on proportion and perspective and how to create depth in my drawings.









One-line drawing by Chiara




