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Dear Parents, Students and Friends

In a keynote address at the Roses for Peace Youth Forum, Ms Grace Fu, former Minister for Culture, Community and Youth, said: "Singapore's social harmony is not by chance, and it should never be taken for granted. Singapore is the world's most religiously diverse country. Multiracialism and multi-religiosity are key tenets of our national values. We have been tireless in our efforts at building this precious social harmony over the past five decades. This social harmony can be easily destroyed, and we would be foolish to take it for granted..."

I believe that these are wise words and that we all should heed this advice. In the January newsletter, I referred to Psalm 139:13-14 where God tells us that we are fearfully and wonderfully made. Due to this, each person has inherent value and therefore should be treated with dignity and respect. In James 2:9, the Bible tell us: "If you show partiality, you are committing sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors". The word that is used for *partiality* is the Greek word "prosopolempsia", which means to treat one person as inherently better or worse than another. This is one of many verses found in the Bible that speak to us on issues related to the differences that exist between people. As we read the Bible, God's message to us is clear; we should love others, regardless of their racial, ethnic or cultural distinctions.

As a school, we have a role in educating our students on the importance of social harmony and how it is the responsibility of individuals and society to maintain it. The school has updated its policies and procedures around these issues to ensure that if such issues occur at school, they are adequately dealt with. One such example is making it clear to students that "casual" racism, including between friends, is harmful and fuels prejudice and discrimination and is, therefore, not acceptable. Throughout the year, the school will be addressing issues such as racial and religious based discrimination and harassment to the students. This will be done through various channels including our Pastoral Care programme, House activities and other one-off events.

We ask for your prayer and support as we tackle these important issues and contribute to making ACS (International) and Singapore a place where people co-exist in harmony with each other.

School Drop Off and Pick Up - Road Rules

In order to be considerate to our neighbours who live in Jalan Hitam Manis and Jalan Puteh Jerneh, we advise parents and drivers to adhere to the following:

- Turn off your engines when waiting to pick up your child from school. With many cars waiting outside the school, the noise of car engines can be quite disturbing to the residents.
- Drive at a safe speed that is below the legal speed limit along the roads near school. The pavements are narrow and often blocked which results in pedestrians, including young children, having to walk on the road. Drivers should be mindful of this and reduce their speed.
- Reduce speed when it is raining in order not to spray puddles of water at students and members of the public who are walking close by.
- Refrain from waiting/parking illegally. It is an offence to park/wait on either side of a road demarcated by a continuous white line or double yellow lines.
- Please do not beep your horn to get your child's attention; this is a noise nuisance to our neighbours.

- Plan your pick-up time with your child to reduce the queuing/waiting time along the road.
- Avoid arriving earlier than the scheduled school dismissal time.
- Do not park in front of the access of any residential unit.
- Be considerate and allow cars from side roads access into the car queue waiting to exit to Holland Village.
- Parents are encouraged to make use of the back gate (Gate C) via Holland Close as a much less congested alternative to drop off your child (see below map for details). We appreciate your support in this matter as we work with those who live around us to provide a safe and enjoyable environment.

Year 5 Student Wins Silver Award in Inaugural Art Prize Competition

Organised by The RICE Company Ltd (TRCL), this competition was founded in the belief of imparting the values of giving-back to the community to support their peers from disadvantaged backgrounds. This competition serves as a fundraiser for The Business Times Budding Artists Fund (BT BAF) which aims to empower more children and youth, regardless of their socio-economic background, to pursue their passion in the arts.

Her work was recently exhibited at the gallery of 10 Square Youth @ Orchard Central. It is currently shown on the <u>TRCL website</u> where members of the public can express their interest through an open auction which will run until 17 February. The funds raised will go towards BT BAF.

Hannah has indeed demonstrated the IGNITE values, as seen in her tenacious effort to strive for excellence. This is her second award in an art competition. She has also been an inspiration for the future generation of artists and youth through her noble act of giving back to the community through art.


SPORTS NEWS

Year 4 Student Shone at Budapest Ice Skating Competition

Amelia Chua (4 GHK) had a very good first-ever European outing, which was also her first overseas competition in more than two years. She competed at the 30th Santa Claus Cup held in Budapest, Hungary, on 3-5 December 2021, with impressive results:

- Two bronze medals in 500m and 1500m
- Qualified for finals and finished in 4th place for 1000m
- Two new personal bests for 500m and 1000m

The competition, sanctioned by the International Skating Union, saw one of the biggest editions with more than 250 skaters and 13 countries participating, and was livestreamed on the Hungarian National Skating Federation channel. OPMUN Singapore

Saw Yone Shou (4 GHK) was appointed as a chair for OPMUN, a local conference that focuses on the affairs within Singapore with an overarching theme of racial and religious harmony in Singapore. The conference took place from 10 to 12 December 2021, with preparation work starting in June. The conference entailed two portions: the conference itself as well as advocacy projects. Yone Shou's advocacy project was on opening more discussions on different races by hosting open discussions with guest speakers from respective religious groups or races. As for the conference portion, she was a co-chair for the Tripartite Council which focused on the treatment of PMETs Singapore.



THIMUN, The Hague Online conference

Saw Yone Shou, Michael Cheung (5 TCT), Hitesh Kishnanin (5 GHK), Keiji Yamamoto (5 TCT), Hannah Lim (4 Thoburn), Lee Seohyeon (4 TKK), Kyren Lavan (6 LSG) attended the annual THIMUN Hague conference from 24 to 28 January. Despite the difference in time zone and late-night committee sessions, the students strived to excel and be active during the conference. Representing Luxembourg, they were in different committees tackling a range of global issues from political, economic to social issues, such as preserving the political interests of nations bordering the South China Sea, coming up with methods to protect oceans from overexploitation, introducing measures to tackle the link between international terrorism and organised crimes, strengthening of security and cooperation in the Mediterranean region, increasing safety and regulation in outer space, and introducing measures to increase youth participation to address climate change. Throughout the conference, they developed more knowledge about the world, honed their critical thinking skills and creativity to come up with new solutions and improved their collaborative, argumentative and communication skills to put their points across when working with other delegates to look for solutions to these global issues.



THIMUN Singapore

few students were part of a large international conference, THIMUN Singapore, from 15 to 19 November 2021. Saw Yone Shou joined as a chair, Pongyada Sootthipong (6 Oldham) as a MUNITY East member while Michael Cheung (4 TCT), Hitesh Kishnanin (4 GHK), Ahbay Malik (4 TKK), Natasha Wong (4 CKS), Hannah Lim (3 Thoburn) and Jian Kim (3 TCT) as delegates. They represented Bulgaria, discussing pressing international issues and coming up with solutions alongside other delegates representing other countries in their committees. This respective experience broadens their knowledge on global issues as well as develop their critical thinking skills.

Yone Shou, as a chair of the Human Rights Council, worked with two other chairs to ensure that the committee sessions went smoothly. Prior to the conference, she worked with a cochair on a chair report/study guide for the council topics (on the question of cyber surveillance on civilians and providing protection and medical support for people suffering from HIV/AIDS) to guide the delegates on their research and preparation for the conference.

During the conference, she oversaw the proceedings of the debate and committee alongside the other chairs. She also guided the delegates throughout the whole process: coming up with solutions, lobbying session and vetted resolution to ensure that the resolutions were of high quality. At the same time, Pongyada worked on informing people about how THIMUN works. She did this by interviewing delegates, student officers and the secretariat team to know about their takes on the conference, which was then integrated into articles that were published in the MUNITY East team which is the daily newspaper reporting on the happenings of the conference.
