Dear Parents, Students and Friends

Keeping ourselves and others safe is something that we all need reminding of from time to time. We have a responsibility to look out for each other. Supporting and caring for each other is a core feature of family life, whether it be the nuclear family, an extended family or our school family. Regular reminders to pedestrians and car drivers to obey the road rules and be considerate of each other in the narrow streets surrounding the school is but one example of helping keep each other safe.

Education and mental health professionals around the world are being increasingly concerned about a new series released on Netflix, '13 Reasons Why' which has the potential to undermine the safety of young people. The show sensationalises serious themes including sexual assault, bullying, drug use and suicide. It has an R18 classification. Parents are alerted to this series and are asked to discuss it with their children. Even if students have not watched the series they may well be hearing about it from classmates. Watching the series does not mean that students are at risk of dangerous behaviours but mental health professionals say that several aspects of the themes covered are at odds with guidelines for keeping ourselves safe.

Any student at ACS (International) who has feelings of deep despair, or who knows of friends who are suffering, is reminded of the various support systems available at school which include the School Counsellor, Nurse, International Student Pastoral Care Coordinator, a trusted teacher, House Tutors, House Masters and senior staff. As Mr Kinch shared in assembly this week, our school motto, *The Best Is Yet To Be* reminds us of hope and that things will be better in the future. We are also each called to action to help others. We have a responsibility to keep ourselves and others safe.

We wish everyone a safe and productive month ahead before the release of Term 2 reports on 24 May and the end of term on 26 May.

PSP Workshop on Bullying for Parents

Bullying is one of the main issues youth face as they grow and develop their own identity. Incidents of bullying, intolerance, put-downs, and exclusion are far too common and far too costly. It is happening earlier, harder to identify, and more often found in cyberspace. Bullying undermines student achievement, and is harmful to young people's social and emotional development. These are challenging issues for families to address, especially since parents/guardians or other adults are often unaware of the incidents that are happening.

Ms Chantal Roux, our school counsellor, will share some cases and talk about awareness of the severity and impact of bullying. Parents will be given tips on how to spot the bully and the bullied, strategies to encourage their children to open up and respond effectively, and taught how to help should their children be involved in bullying or know someone who is.

This will be an interactive workshop with activities (depending on group size), sharing time, and Q & A.

TEDxYouth@HCIS



Fundraising for Bunina High School

In the upcoming June Holidays, a group of students will be visiting Bunina High School in the Gweru area in Zimbabwe. It is a school that ACS (International) has supported in the past.

An old farmhouse is currently used for schooling around 600 primary school students and about 170 senior school students. The school and its students face a great need on many fronts: there is a lack of funds for school facilities, school uniforms, books, stationery, and even running water. Yet many of these children walk willingly and eagerly for an hour and a half to school each day, mostly in bare feet.

Bunina's situation compels us to make an effort to protect and support the aspirations and ambitions of students like our own, and we would value your support for its students and staff.

During the past two years, our students raised funds to start building two classrooms, but these remain unfinished. This year, ACS (International) is hoping to sponsor the education of 12 young girls so that they will not be married off at a young age to provide for the family. Through this, we hope to give them a chance at a better life. Aside from student sponsorship, there are other projects you may like to sponsor: Fencing the school premises for safety, installing a working water pump, completing the new school building, and educational resources. Our students are hoping to raise a sum of \$5000. The need is great and we would like to invite you to share this opportunity to support Bunina.

ACS (International) aims to channel donations made before 20 May 2017 to Bunina School through local organisations whom we supervise to do the work regularly. Receipts of donations will be made available following our visit.

Alumni and the Bone Marrow Donor Programme

Towards the end of last year, a group of students came together to raise funds for the Bone Marrow Donor Programme (BMDP). They raised almost \$1,000 for the BMDP through one of the Casual Dress days. They also planned to get students and staff to register to become donors, but due to a lack of time, this could not happen.





More recently, alumni Dana Sivarajan (Class of 2016) was invited to the BMDP's "Celebration of Heroes" event at SOTA. This event was held to celebrate donors who have stepped forward to donate their bone marrow to save lives. The patron of the BMDP, Minister K Shanmugam, was in attendance.

Who will take up the challenge to encourage members of our school community to register to become donors? There are currently about 75,000 people on the register in Singapore. The BMDP aim to bring it up to 100,000 this year. Registering to be a donor is a simple and painless process.

Who can be a donor?

For students and staff who are interested, anyone between the ages of 17 and 49 can sign up as a bone marrow donor. You need to be in good health and you can apply online at http://bmdp.org/be-a-donor/#donor_signup for a postal kit to be sent to you. Then all you need to do is a simple cheek swab, fill out a form, and send it back to the BMDP.

Chinese Cultural Trip

On 12 April 25 Chinese Language students went on a short cultural trip led by Mr Ang Chew Yan and Mdm Chen Yongzhen. Chinese culture has always been a significant culture in Singapore, but traditions have been given up for the sake of modern progress. Therefore this trip was organised to encourage students to discover the remnants of traditional Chinese culture.

We went to the China Cultural Centre to view an exhibition of Chinese Paintings by the faculty of Guangzhou Academy of Fine Arts. All the students were lost in admiration at the beauty of these remarkable paintings. We also viewed the Centre's library which houses 40,000 books, mainly on Chinese history, culture and current affairs.

After the visit, we walked to Bras Basah Complex, which is also known as the City of Books. It was a cultural feast filled with books, art, music and literature. The complex had many shops with a large selection of second-hand books and magazines. Mr Ang noted that whilst Bras Basah Complex had certainly flourished before, many of its bookstores have closed down in recent times. He took us to two Chinese bookstores in the complex, and we all had a great time wandering in this old building which still retained a strong feeling of a cultural atmosphere.



We live in an era where technology has become indispensable. Fragmented reading has gradually become a major way of reading. Every day, people are bombarded with so much information from our favourite digital platforms, but many of us can barely remember the last time we sat down to read a physical book from cover to cover. It was something I realised of myself after the short field trip in town. It is time for all of us to pick up those traditional ways of reading again to genuinely feel the joy, the peace and the excitement in between the pages.







Year 3 Ecology Field Trip

On Saturday 29 April, the Year 3 Biology students got up close to nature when we visited Hay Dairies, Sky Green Vertical Farms, and Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve, where we learned about the different types of farming and coastal ecosystems in Singapore. We also got to learn about and discuss the impact of humans on the environment.



At Hay Dairies (a goat dairy), we learned about the milk production chain and farming methods, and discussed about the different types of farming.



Vertical Farm system



We then proceeded to Sky Green Vertical Farms, where a variety of leafy vegetables is grown in a vertical space using an efficient system to minimise the farm's environmental impact. The vegetables are grown in stacks of troughs which are rotated to maximise their exposure to sunlight. The whole process is driven by water that is also used to water the plants. We learned about how this 26 million dollar facility is maintained, and engaged in a debate about the sustainability of vertical farming and whether it can support a growing population in land-scarce Singapore. We agreed that vertical farming is more efficient and sustainable than traditional crop farming methods, and has a smaller negative impact on the environment.

Our final stop was Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserves, a well-known mangrove area where Singapore aims to conserve biodiversity of precious flora and fauna. We learned about the importance of mangroves as a habitat for many animal species, their role in protecting our coastlines, and how they are currently being threatened by development and the accumulation of locally and globally generated plastics. Expert biologists from EcoFieldtrips Pte. Ltd. also taught us how to use quadrats for population studies to understand the distribution of organisms in a survey area. There was time allotted for us to walk through the mangroves, and some of us were lucky to spot the different creatures living there, including water snakes, giant spiders, and mudskippers. It was interesting to see how the different plants there have adapted to their environment!

All in all, it was a good opportunity for us to learn more about the local farms and ecosystems, our impact on the earth, and to think about what we can do to lessen it.




