





Happy Birthday, Singapore! On Wednesday 9 August Singapore celebrates 52 years of independence and nationhood growth that is the envy of many countries around the world. As a school we are looking forward to celebrating Singapore's National Day next week, incorporating both a Singaporean and an international flavour into our activities. Singapore is a multicultural society, and at ACS (International) we have over 30 different nationalities making up our unique community, so it seems appropriate for us to have a National Day celebration with an International Day flavour.

Our 13<sup>th</sup> Prefectorial Board led the school assembly this week. It was encouraging to see a number of different student leaders introducing a range of activities and initiatives. The devotion was led by our head students, Kan Chi Mun and Megan Low. They shared how their personal faith had consistently helped in times of difficulty and they encouraged students to put their trust in God. They referred to several scripture passages including John 14:1 – "Do not let your hearts be troubled but trust in the LORD". ## Apple Distinguished Educator, Mr Zhang Youyou

In July, one of our Chinese teachers Mr Zhang Youyou spent a



few days abroad in Australia at the Apple Distinguished Educator (ADE) Academy 2017. Upon his return, he shared some of his experience with us.

#### Welcome back to school. Could you tell us where you have been?

I went to Melbourne to attend the ADE Academy 2017 from 6 to 9 July.

## What were you doing there?

I was excited to meet the ADE class of 2017 and to connect with ADE Alumni, as well as the Apple Education development team. ADE Academy 2017 provided a range of learning opportunities and workshops. The ADE Showcase was the highlight of ADE Academy, and it was impressive to watch brilliant presentations and hear the new stories shared by other ADEs.

## Congratulations on being chosen to be an Apple Distinguished Educator (ADE). Can you tell us more about them?

The Apple Distinguished Educator (ADE) programme is a relationship program focused on educational excellence and leadership. That includes working with each other and with Apple to bring the freshest, most innovative ideas to learners everywhere.

#### Who qualifies as an ADE?

ADEs are K–12 and higher-education pioneers who are using Apple technology to transform teaching and learning.

#### What does an ADE do?

ADEs are recognized for doing amazing things with Apple technology in and out of the classroom. They explore new ideas, seek new paths, and embrace new opportunities. They are active leaders whose aim is to help other educators rethink what's possible with tools such as the iPad and Mac to make learning a deeply personal process for every student.

#### Is there any prize?

Being part of the ADE community is an honour in itself. It's an opportunity to make a difference.



#### There seems to be a focus on the idea of global education. Could you share some of your ideas on how technology can contribute to global education?

Apple creates a wide rage of applications for education, such as Pages, Keynote, Numbers, Garage Band, iMovie, Xcode, Swift Playgrounds, iTunes U, and iBook's Author. Using these tools enable us to conduct, for example, visual storytelling, additional language learning, coding, learning reflection, creativity & humanities as well as formative assessment, professional developments and celebrating success for all learners and teachers.

#### Have you used these in your own classroom?

I have used many information technologies to teach Chinese. I am passionate about making Chinese learning creative, interesting, and as engaging as possible for all of my students. In order to do that, I strive to be as innovative as possible when it comes to teaching students in the classroom. For iMovie, Clips and Keynote, I shared some of the newest features with my students to help them discover the possibilities for telling stories, presenting ideas, and representing change through animations.

#### What do you plan to do as an ADE?

The first on my list is digital books. I learned some advanced use of widgets and template styles from ADE Academy 2017, and I would like to publish some IBDP Chinese LAL and TOK text books with my students. Then we can upload these courses to iTunes U. My students will get involved in the entire process of both publishing the digital book and creating an online course – from planning to grading. Transforming the IBDP LAL and TOK courses will bring more challenges and encourage creativity in the learning journey of my students.

The second is coding. The primary years of schooling are a great time to introduce coding concepts as a way of thinking about the everyday and digital world, and to develop skills in computational thinking. We have currently started the first computer programming (Python) workshop led by Antony Yang (6 OLD). In the near future, more programming workshops will be conducted for students to explore the language of code, enabling them to move to a digital environment by practicing key coding skills.

Thank you Mr Zhang Youyou for sharing your ideas and passion with us. We look forward to seeing what the students can create under your guidance.

#### Dialogue in the Dark

Dialogue in the Dark is an experience jointly organised by Ngee Ann Polytechnic and Dialogue Social Enterprise. Dialogue in the Dark employs visually-impaired guides who guide visitors in complete darkness. Its aim is to raise awareness and facilitate inclusion of marginalised people in our communities.

22 of us went to Ngee Ann Polytechnic with International Student Pastoral Care Coordinator Ms Stacey Low, and Ms Gemma Millar. The point of Dialogue in the Dark was not to scare us or intimidate us, but to give us a sense of how visually-impaired people feel and live. We learned that being visually disabled doesn't equal an inability to live life to the fullest. The fact that they can't see does not mean they don't live fulfilling and meaningful lives.

Through the experience, we got a glimpse of the insecurities, dangers and unsureness which visually disabled people experience. Although it was scary at first, we felt that it was a very meaningful experience, and resolved to be more mindful of visually-impaired people and help them when we can. It was a valuable experience for all of us.

#### CAS Trip to Chiang Mai, Thailand

In the first week of the June holidays, 29 Year 5 students and three teachers set off to Chiang Mai for an eight day long service trip, teaching and building at the Sanpayangwittayakarn School. At the airport, the atmosphere was a mixture of excitement, nerves and anticipation.



We were welcomed to Chiang Mai with a feast of Thai cuisine including Tom Yum soup and mango sticky rice, before heading to the hotel for a restful evening before the challenge began! Early the following day, we set off to the Royal Project Foundation research station lodge, stopping on the way to stock up on teaching supplies and visit the school. The lodge was situated amongst a serene coffee plantation and even had its own on-site coffee shop! The simple lodgings were perhaps a little more basic and close to nature than many of us were used to, but were perfectly located for us to appreciate the beautiful Chiang Mai landscape and get to know an authentic, rural way of life.



The next four days were spent completing service at the Sanpayangwittayakarn School: one group of students quickly developed their construction skills and, guided by a contractor, installed a water filtration unit which provided students of the school with much needed clean drinking water; our most artistic students took on the task of painting the outside areas and decorating the school library with an engaging and educational mural; the budding teachers amongst the group put their teaching planning into action by taking over the teaching of classes ranging from Primary 1 to 6. Needless to say, each group faced their challenges (acquiring resources, overcoming language barriers and keeping their energy up throughout a long day of hard work) but they finished the week with smiles on their faces and much appreciation from the school.



After a tough week, we spent the last two days of the trip experiencing some of the highlights of Chiang Mai: we experienced life as a mahout (elephant trainer), learnt how to cook Thai cuisine and shopped at the bustling night market.

The trip was a genuine learning experience for everyone involved. From learning to sleep and live in more rugged conditions, to working out how to teach large groups of excitable students who spoke minimal English, the experiences have certainly enabled the students at ACS to grow individually and as a team, problem-solve and to step out of their comfort zones!

Through this experience, we developed more respect and felt a sense of gratitude towards the labourers who toil under the hot sun to build our comfortable city and homes.

During the trip, we also learned about the sea communities. These people have an important role in conservation of the marine environment, because their work affects us all. We got to participate in some of these conservation efforts through preparing coral plugs for coral reef restoration, and a marine debris survey.

After all that hard work, we got to explore the breathtaking beauty of Les village which was a real treat. I am glad that we embarked on this journey and got to not only serve the community but also learn more about their culture. As cliché as it may sound, we had so much fun that the eight days passed by in the blink of an eye. It was a truly fulfilling and memorable learning journey.

#### About Rainbow Centre, Singapore

Rainbow Centre Singapore is a not-for-profit Organisation that serves children and young people with a diverse range of moderate to severe developmental special needs, including autism, physical, visual and/or hearing disabilities; many of these children have multiple disabilities. Founded in 1992, Rainbow Centre currently runs two Special Education (SPED) schools for students aged 7-18 years old and two Early Intervention Programme (EIP) centres for children 2 months to 6 years old, at two campuses - Margaret Drive and Yishun Park. Rainbow Centre also trains special education teachers and caregivers, and provides consultancy services for others working with children with special needs through Rainbow Centre Training & Consultancy. Rainbow Centre is a registered charity with the Registry of Societies and an Institution of a Public Character under the Charities Act.

#### About the Building Project

Rainbow Centre Singapore is fundraising for an extension at its Margaret Drive campus to increase its capacity to serve more children. The new purpose-built facility will serve 350 children aged 6 years and below in early intervention, and will also support 130 students aged 7-18 years in its school programme as well as a new Special Student Care Centre for 50 students.

The new extension will also house a training academy to train social service professionals, parents, caregivers and volunteers. The building project is estimated to cost a total of \$17 million, and the cost is supported in part by the Government. Rainbow Centre needs to raise about \$6.5 million towards the project, am aims to complete the extension in 2017.
