

Direct School Admissions

Prospective parents and students are able to apply for admission to next year's classes through our internal admissions tests as well as via formal examination results such as PSLE or O Levels. Direct Admissions applicants in Years 1, 2, 3 and 5 for 2018 should contact the Admissions Department to arrange to sit the English and Mathematics entrance tests. All applicants also undertake an oral interview with a senior member of staff. Direct admissions applicants for Year 1 who do not pass the DSA process are still eligible to reapply after the PSLE results are published in November.

Transcripts and Testimonials

This is the time of the year when we begin to receive requests for transcripts and testimonials.

The Academic Secretary, Ms Manwant Kaur, will process requests for such documents upon receipt of the transcript and testimonial application form which can be downloaded from the website (Application – Transcript Application).

Please note that testimonials are only available for Year 6 students, plus Year 4 students who are leaving school.

All other school leavers in other year groups are only able to apply for a school transcript summary of all school reports.

Applicants must give the school a period of 15 days to process the request and we regret that we are unable to respond to requests to produce them immediately.

Please note that Year 6 students receive these two documents automatically at the end of the year and do not need to make an application for these documents unless making an early application to university.

Airbus French Field Trip

TKK House Community Service

27 students from TKK House took part in Home Sweep Home – a massive inaugural charity event organised by Habitat for Humanity. The project saw members of TKK doing their part to help maintain the homes of elderly people staying at one room flats in Redhill. The event taught us valuable lessons, as we saw the plight of the elderly people of Singapore, specifically those who live alone. Some were not able to even clean their homes themselves, but even those who were able to do so had no means to maintain the upkeep of their homes.





We were put into groups to help the elderly clean their houses, as well as to paint the doors and gates. This gave us a first-hand experience of their situation and living conditions. While they were not all bad compared to those in other countries, they did leave much to be desired. I felt happiness, especially after I finished cleaning the house I was assigned to. The resident of that home was an elderly Malay woman. Even though she was capable of doing some chores on her own, she was always sad that her children left her to live on her own. I felt that the most rewarding part of the project was being able to connect with her and bring her happiness. She was warm and happy in the presence of our company and wrote a letter for the organisation's mural for National Day, wishing for the people of Singapore to be close and tight-knitted as a community. Once I understood this, I realised that the objective of the project was completed; we were not merely there to clean homes, but also there to reach out and to connect with those in need.

Initially, many of us did not know how we would interact with such young children, but we warmed to each other very quickly. There was also a trip the beach as a reward to some of them for doing well in school. At the end, it was heart-breaking for both sides to say goodbye, as we had grown so fond of each other.



Next, we visited Hoa Binh Village, a specialised hospital ward for victims of Agent Orange. The memory of what we saw there is still so vivid. It was difficult to accept that what we saw was real, and that innocents still suffered years after the war had ended. Despite the language barrier, we connected with the children through songs, origami, and soccer.



Our time at the Thien Phuoc Centre for disabled children really put things into perspective for us. The children had suffered so much, but they were content with what they had. It made us feel painfully conscious of how much we take for granted.

The rest of our trip was spent at a forest resort in Madagui, ziplining, trekking, swimming and paintballing – a good time to grow closer to our schoolmates.



Who could forget this experience? We had planned to help the less fortunate, but we ended up receiving so much more than we gave. We are truly thankful for this experience and to everyone who made it possible.


