Gong Xi Fa Cai! Our best wishes to everyone over this Lunar New Year period. We trust that the Year of the Rooster will be one of prosperity and happiness for all.

The Rooster has great symbolism in many cultures. The Bible story of the crowing of the rooster after Peter denied Christ three times is well known. Peter was distraught, repented and experienced grace and forgiveness. In Christian tradition the rooster has therefore come to symbolize the offer of divine pardon for sin through Jesus Christ. Many churches in Europe have a rooster on top of their steeples, and in the Netherlands many older churches have golden rooster weather vanes. The golden rooster is said to be a symbol of Jesus Christ who breaks the power of darkness, brings forgiveness of sins, and announces a new day by the power of His resurrection. For Roman Catholics the rooster symbolizes Saint Peter, who is regarded as the first Pope.

Before the birth of Jesus Christ, the rooster was associated with the sun, the symbol of the Creator, because it crows before dawn. At sun shrines in Japan roosters freely roam the grounds. The Khasi people believe in the sacrifice of a rooster as a substitute for man, because they believe that the cock when sacrificed "bears the sins of the man." Similarly in Judaism where the Hebrew word 'gever' means both "man" and "rooster", a rooster sacrifice is as a substitute for the sins of a person.

Thankfully as Christians we do not need to sacrifice any animal for the forgiveness of sin as Christ has already done that on our behalf once for all. 'For God's will was for us to be made holy by the sacrifice of the body of Jesus Christ, once for all time.' Hebrews 10:10. We are therefore not bound by superstition and are able to enjoy all that God has to offer.

IBDP 45 Pointer - Li Changrui

Following a re-mark of examination papers, we are pleased to announce that Li Changrui's grade has been upgraded from 44 to 45 points.

We congratulate him on his perfect IBDP score. This is the second year in a row that an ACS (International) student has gained 45 points.

Pleasing IGCSE 2016 Examination Results

ACS (International) students in the November 2016 IGCSE examination scored a 91.6% pass rate narrowly exceeding last year's previous best pass rate in recent years of 91.4%.

Distinction passes of 50% were slightly lower than last year's previous best of 53%.

Fourteen students in the 172 strong cohort gained all Distinction passes (A * or A) – compared to 17 last year and 12 the year before. These top performing students who each gained 100% Distinction passes were Siddhantha Awasthi, Chen Jiashu, Kalyani Samir Garud, Michelle The, Wu Jiaqi, He Zhuoxi, Chen Kangan, Vieri Harney, Jiang Zixin, Wang Zelin, Ultima Sirithanawat, Samyak Yalvigi, Wu Yihui, and Yang Tze-Te.

Top performing subjects included Music and Hindi with 100% pass rates; followed by English Language and Additional Mathematics 96.7%, Mathematics 95.9%, Geography 94.2%, Physical Education 94%, English Literature 93.4%, Physics, 93.3%, and Chemistry 92.4%. The highest percentage of distinctions were in Music (80%), Physics (70%), Chemistry (67%), Mathematics (64%), and English Literature 55%.

Top of the World results are released later in the year. The school has gained 17 of these prestigious awards over the previous seven years in English Literature, English Language, Economics, Mathematics, Additional Mathematics, Geography, Physical Education and Chinese.

We congratulate both students and staff on the high quality IGCSE results.


Cambridge Bound – Ivan and Zhaomou

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School Fees

Many thanks to all families who have paid the school fees. To those families who have yet to pay the Semester I fees a final notice will be sent out next week. We regret to advise that we will have to withdraw students from class if fees remain unpaid.

A reminder for returning Year 5 students that the school Deposit needs to be 'topped up' to \$6,000 due to the drawn payments for camp and examination fees. The IBDP is regarded as a separate two year school programme, hence the request for the top up.

In addition, we remind IBDP families of the refund policy for IB students who leave before the end of Year 6. If an IB student leaves the school before the end of the two year course the full deposit is forfeited. This measure was introduced two years ago to recover some lost income due to early withdrawal. The school is unable to replace any student who leaves the IB programme after the first month or so as it is too difficult for a new student to catch up on missed work. We are therefore not able to replace withdrawn students and recover lost fees.

Uniform Matters

Please note the following regulations:

PE Uniform: Students may **not** wear PE kit to school. All students should arrive to school in full school uniform. Similarly, students must not wear PE kit to lessons/tutor time/assembly/Chapel. All students are given ample time after and between lessons in order to change out of their PE attire and into their school uniform

Shoes: School shoes must be 'all white' or 'all black'. Flashes or logos with other colours are not permitted.

Tattoos: These are not allowed.

Hair: A reminder that hair should be of a natural colour and kept tidy. Boys should ensure that their hair is kept short.

Restricted Entry to School by Vehicles at Start of the Day

Due to the heavy congestion at the school gate by both vehicles and foot traffic we restrict vehicle entry to the school grounds to just staff cars between 7.30 and 8.10am.

This means that parents are not able to enter the school grounds to drop off their children. All drop offs must be outside the main gate at the drop off zone. On wet days however, parents will still be able to access the covered drop off zone outside the Administration Block.

With an increased roll there is increased congestion at the school entrance and students on foot are contributing to that. Parents are encouraged to make use of the back gate via Holland Close as a much less congested alternative to drop off their children. (see below map for details).

Singapore International Schools' Debate League

The Singapore International Schools' Debate League (SISDL) is a student-led debate competition run by members of the Debate Club. Since its inauguration, students from local international schools have been invited to participate.

This year, teams from local and overseas schools were invited to attend for the first time, resulting in the biggest turnout yet. More than 200 participants across 40 teams from Singapore and Asia came together from 14 – 15 January to debate on a wide range of motions such as international treaties, LGBTQ rights, monopolies, New Atheism, and education. Participating overseas teams came from Malaysia, China, Philippines, and Indonesia, whilst local teams consisted of the Singapore National Debate team (World Schools Debating Championship team), Hwa Chong Junior College, Anglo-Chinese Junior College, United World College Dover, St. Joseph's Institution, St. Joseph's Institution International, Singapore American School, and our own school's team. Most of our top school debaters were unable to participate in the debates due to being on the organising committee.

To make this all possible, a veritable army of students including Student Prefects, volunteers, and the debate EXCO put in three months' of intensive planning and coordination. This concentrated effort resulted in an event that was well received by all the participants, with many posting positive comments on social media. Praise for SISDL included appreciation of our students' warm hospitality and how well-organised it was.

Alumni Catch Up – Jessica Venly



In late January this year, we received some heart-warming news from Jessica Venly, one of our alumni. With her permission, we are sharing it below.

Jessica joined ACS (International) in 2009, and graduated with an IB Diploma in 2011. She has since become her own boss, and started her own property development company in 2015. Here is what she had to say about her time with us:

"I am writing to say thank you and to recognise ACS (International) for who I am today. ACS has been a crucial institution in my life. Not only did I gain academic knowledge, I also grew as a person.

I started my own property development company in 2015. I believe that knowledge can be gained anywhere, and provided by any institution. But what I have today, what I have gained from my time at ACS, cannot be substituted. I am now running my first project with an estimated worth of \$\$20 million. This wouldn't be possible if not for the support from the teaching staff. They were a constant source of encouragement and helped me see what I was capable of. Regarding my company, I should say it is not easy working in an Eastern cultural context, since I'm a fresh graduate and a female. But I will persevere.

Whenever people ask me which school I graduated from, I know that they want to know which university I attended. But I never forget to say that I graduated from ACS (International), because it laid down an important foundation and made me who I am today. Because of my own experience, students I have spoken to have shown great interest in ACS (International) – some have already joined the school, whilst others are even thinking of transferring schools. I believe that this is not because I have good marketing skills. I know in my heart that it is because I am sharing my love for my alma mater and how much it invested in me.

I'm now in my final year of an MBA in Australia whilst running my project. It has been very hectic, but I am confident that I am able to do both because the IB Diploma Programme has prepared me for it.

US/Canada Trip 2017

The Humanities and Higher Education department is organising its 7th Business/University visit trip to Vancouver, Seattle and Los Angeles from **27 May – 5 June 2017.** The objectives of the trip are that students will visit some of the countries' universities including campus tours of the University of British Columbia, the University of Washington and UCLA. They will also be able to hone their business presentation skills with experiences at Simon Fraser College and UCLA.

The unique selling point of the trip is that students will be housed in the university dormitories instead of hotels (except for a one night hotel stay in Seattle). They will also have most of their meals in the university cafeterias, so that they can have a first-hand experience of university life. Students will get to speak to university representatives about entry requirements. In addition, students will attend a workshop lecture on business plan preparations and will need to prepare a business plan to be presented at UCLA Anderson Business.

Introduction to Singapore

The orientation of new international students included a whole day induction programme. Our day started on 21 January with a hearty breakfast of the Malay dish, Nasi Lemak. We met Ms. Stacey Low, our Pastoral Care Coordinator, and were introduced to some of our seniors, who welcomed us with open arms and warm hearts. As part of the Singapore Experience Programme, we were introduced to our host families. Our host families are members of the Holland Village Methodist Church who kindly took up the task of looking after us and helping us explore and get to know Singapore.

With the formalities out of the way, we boarded buses to start our Singapore tour. On board the bus we were introduced to Mr. Logan, our guide for the day. He told us stories of what Singapore was like back in the day, about its culture, its people, and many other interesting things.

Our first stop was Chinatown. Chinatown was full of everything related to the Chinese culture; amongst many things there were wanton noodles, firecrackers, lanterns, good-luck coins and Chinese people. It felt like a tiny part of some place in China had been removed from the mainland and brought to Singapore. We spilt up into our own groups to explore Chinatown on our own before gathering back at the Chinatown Visitor Centre. The sun was blazing down, so everyone found some way of cooling down while waiting for the buses; some of us bought ice cream sandwiches or soda, others produced fans, and others acted like vampires and hid in the shade.

The next stop was Singapore's National Library. We had a quick tour of the building with a lot of stories, and learned about the library's loan system. After the tour we got to explore the library for a little while.

Little India was the last stop of our adventure. Mr. Logan showed us the Indian art of henna, where an artist draws on skin with special ink, leaving behind intricate patterns of swirls and lines. Some of us even decided to get tattooed as well, with flowers, lines, spiders, dragons and other images. We were allowed to explore Little India on our own for a while before meeting at the Little India Heritage Museum, where we learned about the Indian culture in Singapore. Everyone also got a souvenir; the tail feather of a peacock, with its beautiful shades, of green, blue and brown.

It was then time for lunch. We feasted on various Singaporean dishes like roti prata, chicken rice and nasi padang. We were actually supposed to visit another place after this, but our plans were disrupted due to wet weather so we returned home early.

Despite not being able to discover if Kampong Glam really is glamorous, we had a marvelous journey. We had embraced Singapore with open arms, experienced new things and acquainted ourselves with her culture and people. This is one trip we will truly never forget, and a great way to start the year; with a bang.


