## **Dear Parents, Students and Friends**

This last week of term we have enjoyed the annual school Athletics Sports Day which featured 23 new records and our largest number of competitors, and we have celebrated many excellent results recorded in the Term 1 report grades. The top sports performances and awards will be itemised in the April issue of our Newsletter. We congratulate all the successful students on their achievements.

At the Sports Day and the Wednesday assembly presentation of Principal's List and Distinction certificates, the positive affirmation of successful students by both staff and other students was most encouraging. Strong and positive relationships are at the heart of our school. We believe that students respond better to positive reinforcement as opposed to punitive correction. 'Honey rather than vinegar'! Professor John Hattie of the University of Melbourne has published a number of books and academic articles based on his extensive research to find the factors that most influence student achievement. Positive relationships improve student learning by nearly two times the average achievement expected in a year. (Other high scoring factors include Teacher Expectations, Questioning, Direct and Guided Teacher Instruction, Study Skills, Feedback, Classroom Discussion, Teacher Credibility, and Student Expectations of themselves).

Christians too can expect a positive relationship with God our Father. He is not a distant God but one who wants to relate closely with us. The Parable of the Prodigal Son, and other parables including the Lost Sheep and the Lost Coin are examples of how God wants a close relationship with us. According to biblical scholars, there are approximately 25,000 words that Jesus spoke recorded in the Bible. Of those 25,000 words, Jesus taught about the Father in Heaven at least 181 times. This translates to 1 out of every 140 words where Jesus spoke about His Father, whom He referred to as 'Abba Father', an Aramaic word roughly translated as "Daddy". Jesus' central message and purpose was to restore us to a relationship with our Dad in Heaven.

At our 131<sup>st</sup> Founder's Day celebration held on 1 March our Guest of Honour, Mr Cheo Chai Hong, a senior leader in UOB Bank and former President of the ACS Old Boys Association, spoke about the impact of the ACS Chapel services which led to him developing a close relationship with God, plus the strong relationships he formed with other ACS boys which continues today. Some of the many benefits of an ACS education!

This week is the last week of Term 1 and we wish everyone a safe and enjoyable week's break from lessons and we look forward to the start of Term 2 on 20 March.

## **Further information:**

Travel arrangements: ACJC is also accessible via the back gate at Block 2a Dover Rise. It is recommended that students make their way to ACJC on foot to avoid traffic congestion in this area.

**Attire:** Students should wear their PE attire and bring an umbrella/raincoat in case of bad weather.

Wet weather plans: Tutors will notify students by email if the walk is cancelled due to bad weather.

**Arrival**: Students should look out for the ACS (International) balloons and assemble there with their House Tutors.

**Dismissal**: Students will be dismissed from the venue at approximately 10.15am by their House Tutors. They must make their own travel arrangements to return home.

As this is an official school event, if for any reason students are not able to attend this event due to external club commitments, students will be expected to get a note from their coach confirming this, otherwise it will be marked as 'absent from school activities'.

# **Awards from Term Reports**

The academic report for Term 1 is available in the school parent portal https://parents.acsinternational.com.sg/api/login.

You can access the parent portal from the school website under Contact Us / Parent Login. Once you are in the portal, please go to School Profile / School Reports / View Student's school Assessments / 2016 Term 3. Or you may install the iParent app using Code: ACS and log in using the same parent portal credentials.

If you have not accessed the parent portal previously and have not received any information regarding the parent portal, you may email rosdiawati@acsinternational.com.sg for help.

The term reports this year will give feedback on three aspects of work: Subject Attainment; Attitude to Learning; and Completion of Work. The Subject Attainment grade will be an amalgamation of 'Attainment' and 'Tests and Coursework' from previous years. The new Attainment grade is a reflection of a student's academic achievement in relation to potential achievement for that term only.

It will therefore be possible for students to gain a Grade 7 (the maximum grade) in each term if s/he performs at an outstanding level. The Attainment grade will be derived from a combination of both formal and informal assessment.

As a result of the change to Report grades we have adjusted the Report Awards as per the following table. To gain the Principal's List or Distinction commendation, a student must achieve all subjects with grades 6 or 7.

# Model United Nations of the University of Chicago

In February this year, 12 students, accompanied by Mr. Christopher Bossan and Ms Analiza Garcia, participated in the Model United Nations of the University of Chicago held in Chicago, IL. The conference had about 2,600 participants from the surrounding states and other countries including China, South Africa and Japan. We represented Serbia in a wide range of committees: Legal, SOCHUM, ECOSOC and continuous crisis. Our delegates were from all over the world too, from countries such as Malaysia, Thailand, Britain and Singapore.

After weeks of research, procedural and debate preparation, delegates debated on solutions to the big questions and issues of our time, with topic such as Securing the Movement of Refugees, Improving Global Access to Education, Responsibility to Respond to Nuclear Accidents and to name a few. Our delegates put in hours of debating, lobbying and writing within their respective committees during committee sessions, sharing their perspectives and ideas with other delegates from Puerto Rico, Canada and China. The delegates engaged in meaningful debates and collaborated with members of their committees, forming blocs and drafting and presenting Working Papers, which after more Unmoderated Caucuses and debates, would finally become a Resolution deserving of the committee's vote and approval. Three delegates, Dhruv Uppal, Leow Yong Tee and Naveen Venkat, (pictured) were awarded Outstanding Delegates of their respective committees during the MUNUC 2017 closing ceremony.

Other than debating, the delegation immersed themselves in the culture of the windy city. We were lucky enough to stay at the Palmer House Hilton, the 150 year old hotel where the conference was held. # NUS FASS Summer Seminar Programme for ACS (International)

In collaboration with the National University of Singapore Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences (NUS FASS), our school was delighted to have the opportunity to take Year 6 students of Theory of Knowledge to a seminar on 22 February.

The theme of the seminar was "Post-Truth: Can human behaviour be understood via generalisations?"

In the morning, the students attended two lectures, one by Associate Professor Paulin Straughan on "The social construction of Reality", which gave an insight into how people determine "truths". The second lecture was by Associate Professor Narayanan Ganapathy, and investigated qualitative data and observations on the phenomenon of post-truth.

This was followed by a breakout session in the afternoon where students were taken through the Asch Experiment, a famous experiment designed to test how peer pressure to conform would influence the judgement and individuality of a test subject.



In conversation with some students, it was good to hear that they became more aware that the notions we take for granted, such as social class and romantic love, are conceptualised by society. Adding to that, they learned that the separation of objective and subjective reality is a frame of reference when they examine how knowledge is constructed in the Natural Sciences as compared with Human Sciences.

The lecturers brought to our attention that those who deviate from the norms which are socially constructed are then marginalized, once again because of social constructs.

The material on quantitative and qualitative approaches to data collection lent itself to some of the knowledge questions in the Human Sciences that is part of their TOK course, e.g. to what extent are the methods of the human sciences 'scientific'?

The lecturers were generous in distilling their vast knowledge and experience in the most engaging way to our students.

It can be said the conference achieved its objectives, given the feedback from students. We give a sample of these responses:

## Wong Yu Wen

This TOK seminar was a great chance for students to experience a university lecture from real professors on an interesting yet little known subject. I found Professor Straughan and Professor Ganapathy's sociology lectures to be well delivered and, more importantly, very meta and very thought provoking - which aligns with the purpose of TOK.

#### **Neha Matani**

The TOK Seminar was truly an eye-opening experience as we were shown how the scope of TOK could be viewed from other disciplines and perspectives. We were presented with how the concept of human behaviour under the AOK Human Sciences could be considered from the lens of a sociological perspective. The debate concerning the generalization of humans was especially interesting to understand through the concepts of quantitative and qualitative sociology. The presentations made for an engaging discussion about generalizations, giving us students a deeper understanding of knowledge as a whole.

Social norms was another concept that was explored in the lectures. Prof Gana highlighted the idea that people who deviate from social norms are often marginalised due to these created social constructs. We then took part in a social conformity experiment and through this we learnt the reasons as to why people tend to conform to social norms and how ethics play a role in the production of knowledge. Overall, this experience was very insightful as it helped us understand how "truths" are formed and how society forms a framework for behaviour. Apart from that, the seminar proved to be very useful as it gave us an idea as to what we could include in our arguments for the oral presentation and essay.


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# Journey To Infinity: Escher's World of Wonder

Year 5 students were given an exceptional opportunity to visit the exhibition of the works of M. C. Escher, one of the world's most famous graphic artists, at the ArtScience Museum, Marina Bay Sands.

Linked with the study of Theory of Knowledge, the exhibition showed how the ways of knowing of Imagination, Sense Perception and Emotion informed the Visual Arts. In addition, it gave evidence that Areas of Knowledge can be interdisciplinary with the Arts interfacing with Mathematics and Science.

Students stepped inside M.C. Escher's playful world of imagination and wonder - of poetic geometry, and the bending of perception with impossible constructions which defied gravity. Featuring over 150 original works, the exhibition included his early prints and drawings inspired by nature and Italy's landscape. The exhibition further explored M.C. Escher's work on tessellation and transformation of shapes illustrating how metamorphosis became a unique feature of his art where fantasy blends with geometry.



As they browsed the exhibits, students completed a worksheet prepared by Mr Peter Talbot. Here are some of the responses of our students.

Question: What knowledge do you gain from looking at Escher's work?

There are multiple perspectives in every object/situation and one look will not tell you the entirety of the story.

# Singapore Writers' Festival – Writers Visit

How does it feel not to fit in? How does it feel to be an 'other'? How does it feel to grow up in a culture where you are different?



Alice Pung, award-winning and internationally published writer, addressed these questions when she spoke to Year 5 and 6 English B students on 28 February. She visited the school as part of the Singapore Writers' Festival and delivered a talk entitled 'I am Multicultural'.

Alice Pung's parents are Chinese, but spent much of their lives in Cambodia. During the Khmer Rouge regime, they fled to Australia, where Alice was born and has lived since.

During her talk, Alice Pung spoke about how, growing up in a different culture so different to that in which her parents did, she struggled at times to connect with them and appreciate their struggles, stories and values. At the same time, she conveyed the difficulties of being different to her Australian classmates; how she would be called names, and how she gradually came to understand what these words meant. Ultimately however, it was clear from the wealth of stories that she had to share, that Alice's experiences of multiculturalism had provided her with a deep appreciation of all the cultures around her. Sometimes humorous, sometimes poignant, her stories were without doubt informative and fascinating for the IB students and teachers.

Linking her ideas to their learning of cultural diversity, the Year 5 and 6 students asked questions and reflected on these ideas, considering how what Alice Pung spoke of might be relevant in the very multicultural context of Singapore


