Dear Parents, Students and Friends,

In March this year, I visited Israel and the West Bank, where I toured Ramallah. As I was driving through, I saw a sign pointing towards “Baccalaureate Schools” which I didn’t expect to see. When I saw the sign, I thought how interesting it was that there was an IB World School (IBWS) in the West Bank and I wondered what it would be like to live out the IB Mission in that context. Further research showed that this school wasn’t an IBWS, but my thought remained as there is an IBWS in Ramallah called the Ramallah Friends School. Later that week, I drove through Sderot, Nir Am, Kfar Aza and Sa’ad, and in doing so also past Gaza. I couldn’t have imagined the conflict and human suffering which would befall these regions in the not-so-distant future.

The Mission Statement for the International Baccalaureate is to develop inquiring, knowledgeable and caring young people who help to create a better and more peaceful world through intercultural understanding and respect. At ACS (International) our expression of the IB mission has always been in the context of peace. However, there are many schools and educators throughout the world who find themselves in war and conflict zones, where the mission of creating a better and more peaceful world takes on a visceral urgency. I find myself wondering, how do teachers and leaders in these schools teach their students peace in the midst of war?

As I watch the conflicts that are emerging across the world, I become more convinced of the need for schools to promote peace through the values of knowledge, care and respect. I consider with awe, those who are courageously teaching intercultural understanding and peace through times of war. We are fortunate to live in a country that enjoys peace and security, and it is not something that we should ever take for granted. I am powerless to change the conflicts which exist in the world today. However, what is possible is to have a renewed sense of determination to teach and live out the IB Mission Statement at ACS (International). My desire is that by developing in our students the skills and traits required for a better and more peaceful world, we would help contribute to a generation of leaders who have the skills to solve the issues that can lead to hatred, conflict and war.

Australian Intermediate Mathematics Olympiad (AIMO) 2023

The Australian Intermediate Mathematics Olympiad (AIMO) is a highly challenging maths competition designed to identify and stretch talented students. The AIMO paper is pitched at a Year 10 level but may also be of interest to motivated and talented students in Years 7 to 9 looking to pursue Olympiad-level mathematics.

AIMO may be suitable to students who have:

- an interest and aptitude for more complex mathematical problem solving
- completed later stages of the AMT's Maths Enrichment program
- scored very highly in the Australian Mathematics Competition
- undertaken substantial extension work outside of the curriculum.

AIMO contains unique problems designed each year by leading educators and academics to challenge and assess students' problem-solving skills. The questions range in difficulty. It is expected that only a small number of students will be able to complete the whole paper. There is one AIMO paper which can be sat by students from Years 7 to 10. Time allowed is 4 hours.

On 7 September, 7 students (Years 1 to 4) from ACS (International) took part in AIMO 2023. The list of High Distinction and Distinction award recipients for ACS (International) is given below.
