Junior Division Touch Cyber Wellness Pastoral Classes

During the Pastoral time in April, the Junior Division took part in online classes with Touch Cyber Wellness. These cyber wellness sessions are part of the broader House and Pastoral programmes to develop healthy digital citizens. The Junior Division students all received access to online learning at the start of the year, explaining ACS (International) device and social media policies. During House Assembly time, each House presented on cyberbullying and digital citizenship.

Touch Cyber Wellness covered topics such as Cyberbullying and Social Media for our Year 1 students, and Mindless Scrolling on Social Media and Doxxing for Year 2 students.

I found that the video we watched on a Singaporean man falsely accused of a cyclist road rage incident to be the most interesting, as netizens were quick to point fingers at the supposed perpetrator. I found it unfortunate that the man's personal information, such as his name, workplace, and even things about his family, became widely spread online, and I can only imagine that it would have been a difficult time to go through, especially since he ended up not even being involved in the road rage incident. I think that the netizens who doxxed him and sent hateful comments were unaware of how dangerous it could be to speculate online- it probably felt relatively harmless in the moment. This is why I believe that this cyber wellness talk was an excellent opportunity to spread awareness of such online threats.

The International Conference for Societies of Opportunity – ICSO

The International Conference for Societies of Opportunity–ICSO, was a 1.5-day conference that I had the remarkable opportunity to attend as a student of ACS (International). The conference served as a platform for policymakers, researchers, and practitioners to come together and exchange ideas on how we can foster a society where social mobility is accelerated to truly allow the global economy to prosper. The speeches made at the conference centered around how disadvantaged groups could be uplifted in order to allow them higher economic and social mobility, as well as the key roles that businesses and individuals play in fostering the growth of this ideal of a society. Many of the topics and research discussed were crucially relevant to me as an IB student, and it gave depth to the content I am currently studying in the HL Business Management syllabus. The Keynote speakers Professor Danny Quah from the Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy and Professor Raj Chetty from Harvard University brought up critical and relevant economic research, like the illuminating findings supporting economic models like the Growth-Mobility curve and the Great Gatsby curve, as well as the research behind the origin of economic opportunity, and how policies can play a role in making economic opportunity accessible to all.

Inspiring and informational speeches from other plenary session speakers like Mr. Tom Hall—the CEO of UBS Optimus Foundation Network—brought to light the next steps that Global Powers could take in order to maximise the impact of policies, as well as how philanthropic finance can be utilised to help nations achieve their development goals, aligning with the UN’s own Sustainable Development Goals. The conference itself was an inspiring and uplifting event that brought together people from across various backgrounds, in order to work hard through the challenges we face as a society. And, in the words of Mr. Masagos Zulkifli—Singapore’s Minister for Social and Family development—as the world continues to change, so too must we, we must continue to rethink how we can achieve social mobility despite these trends, with this mindset trends will not become threats but opportunities to grow.

Attending the two-day ICSO international conference was a meaningful experience for me. What impressed me most on the first day was the morning session, where two speakers explained about the triangle relationship between economic growth, social mobility, and income inequality. One speaker explained how growth can lead to greater mobility, while another showed how improving mobility can actually support long-term economic growth, and how "place-based" investments and better education access can help create equal opportunities.

I had previously learned about these concepts in IB Economics, but hearing experts explain real-world data and case studies helped me understand these ideas in greater depth. I also learned many new concepts such as the Great Gatsby Curve, which shows that high inequality often comes with low mobility. I believe this session was a great extension of my classroom learning, helping me see how theory applies to real economics, and gain more insights about the main concept in IB Economics of "economic well-being".

On the second day, I joined a breakout session on human capital and job opportunities. I used to somewhat naively think that a bank is just a bank, and a transport company simply runs buses. However, through this session, I saw how companies like Standard Chartered, SBS Transit, and Changi Airport Group play a deeper role in promoting economic inclusion and supporting disadvantaged groups. This made me understand that society always functions as an interconnected system, where businesses are not isolated entities but active contributors to social well-being. Building a more inclusive economy is not just the job of governments or charities—it’s a shared responsibility that involves every stakeholder, including each one of us.

As someone who hopes to study economics at university, I found this conference especially inspiring and enriching. It helped me see beyond textbooks and understand the real-world impact of economic thinking.

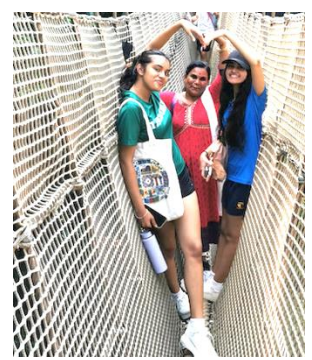

PSP Workshop: Boosting Teen Executive Skills

One of the most rewarding initiatives for the Parent School Partners (PSP) is organising educational workshops that serve and strengthen our parent community. When we share information and develop practical skills, we not only grow as individuals but also enrich our everyday family connections.

With this spirit in mind, PSP recently conducted an interest poll to identify the top three workshop topics parents were most eager to explore. More than half of the year groups selected “Supporting Teen Success” as the top priority.

Thanks to the tremendous support of our school counsellors – especially Dr Charlina Gozali – we were introduced to PsychConnect, who provided two expert presenters: Dr Zainab Shaikut, Senior ADHD and Executive Functioning Coach, and Ms Kaitlyn Morgan, Principal Occupational Therapist.

Held on Friday, 16th May at Oldham Chapel, the workshop drew a record-breaking 70 parents and PSP Exco, both in person and online. Charlina opened the session by sharing insights into device usage patterns at school and outlining the school’s pastoral care resources and processes. Dr Zainab and Ms Morgan then delved into the biological, sensory, and emotional aspects of executive functioning, offering clarity on behaviours typical from adolescence through young adulthood.

What made the session especially valuable were the real-life strategies shared – practical tools parents could apply at home, independently and with confidence. The interactive atmosphere encouraged open discussion, and parents left feeling empowered with both knowledge and support.

This successful collaboration between PSP, Dr Gozali, and PsychConnect reinforced the importance of continuous self-development and accessible support systems for families. We extend our heartfelt thanks to the school counsellors, IT department, SLT and teachers who made the event possible and who visited, and to the many parents who participated and engaged so thoughtfully.

We look forward to offering more workshops in the future, continuing our journey of learning and growth together.

Firstly, Dr. Zainab and Kaitlyn were great presenters and their expertise and experience definitely showed in both the content of their presentation and their answers to parents’ questions. True to the title of the workshop, they broke down the concept of ‘executive function’ (EF) very clearly and succinctly with practical everyday examples at home. They explained the requirements and conditions for EF to work (e.g. ‘downstairs’ and ‘upstairs’ brain), and then, highlighted areas where teens commonly needed help. They shared useful frameworks, such as the ‘Pyramid of Learning’, that will help identify the teen’s areas of development, as well as, a range of tools, habits, and exercises to support that development. They educated us on the role of an EF coach and occupational therapist, and the process of working with a teen; all without being pushy or ‘salesy’, just simply sharing.

“The workshop has given me a few things that I can do at home to support my teen’s development, and also confidence in experts who have experience dealing with the unique challenges of being an IB student. Along with other school workshops such as ‘Tuning into Teens’, events like this tell me that the ACS community really cares about bringing out the full potential of both the student and parent in a holistic and wholesome manner.
