The conference challenged me to continue to strengthen the connections that define our humanity not only in theory, but in the day-to-day moments of kindness, care, and understanding that shape the culture of our school.

World Mathematics Championship

On 15 February 2025, 12 students from ACS (International) participated in the Senior Regionals of the World Mathematics Championship (WMC) at UWC South East Asia (Dover Campus). Meanwhile, on 22 February 2025, 9 students took part in the Secondary Regionals held at UWC South East Asia (East Campus). Students from Years 4 to 6 competed in the Senior Regionals, while students from Years 2 and 3 represented the school in the Secondary Regionals.

The WMC brought together top young mathematicians from international schools in Singapore, and our students rose to the challenge with determination, teamwork, and passion. Our school is proud of the 21 participants, all of whom dedicated time and effort in preparation for these regionals. They are listed in the tables below.

Weeks of diligent preparation and rehearsals finally came to fruition on Friday 28 February 2025, when ACS (International) celebrated the 139th ACS Founder's Day as well as its 20th anniversary. The ACS (International) Sports Hall came alive at 8.30am that day as the Founder's Day celebrations commenced with the flag parade, comprising the Singapore flag, ACS Flag, House Flags, and the flags representing the various nationalities of our student body, all played to the accompanying White Falcon (Medley) played by the ACS (International) Philharmonic Orchestra.

After the National Anthem, and Singapore Pledge, came a passionate rendition of the hymn To God Be The Glory. Then Principal Mr Gavin Kinch delivered his address commemorating the history of the founding of ACS, and the subsequent founding of ACS (International), and the role the school had played in the holistic and international-minded education. After the Contemporary Singers sang the Chris Tomlin piece Amazing Grace, Rev Jeremy Ong, pastor-in-charge of Holland Village Methodist Church (HVMC) delivered the Founder's Day and 20th birthday greetings from Bishop Philip Lim, Methodist Bishop of Singapore. The performances were part of the Cool Classics programme and a fitting way to celebrate the school's 20th birthday.

ACS (International) Principal Mr Gavin Kinch introduced the performances and then the emcee, Kiss92 DJ and ACS (International) alumnus Shawnia Seah took over. Under the capable and charismatic baton of Maestro Lim Soon Lee, the orchestra wasted no time as they led everyone into a spirited rendition of Johann Strauss's Radetzky March, which was then adroitly followed by Journey to Zargon from Final Fantasy 10.



24 Feb Deep Dive: US Apps, Insights from Alumni and Live Q & A

We hosted Ashley Mya Gozali (6 TCT 2024) for this deep dive session during lunch. Ashley received an offer from Boston College during the US Early application round. Here are some insights she shared with students who attended.



“When crafting your activities list and honours/awards for US applications, I believe it is important to choose activities that you truly enjoy. Balancing IB and college applications is incredibly time consuming and difficult at times. There will be moments when you will need to put in extra hours and sacrifice your down time. However, by committing to activities and responsibilities that you are truly passionate about and have fun doing, you will still enjoy the process no matter how tiring it may be. Moreover, stay true to yourself! Colleges want to know who you are, what you value, and how your personality, goals, and values will match with the school’s. The more you know yourself, the more admissions will know about you! “



7 March Deep Dive : Applying US Early, Oxbridge and Crafting a Portfolio

We hosted David Kim Sunbin (6 SVM 2024), who has enrolled in University of Chicago and Om Nitin Acharekar (6 CKS 2024), University of Cambridge offer holder, for a lunchtime talk. It was fascinating to see how David and Om had such different experiences and approaches to their US and UK applications—each equally valid in its own way. From a counsellor’s perspective, it’s a great reminder that there’s no single “correct” path. With so much advice out there—both online and in person—it is important to be mindful. Take what resonates, leave what doesn’t, and always feel free to check in with the Higher Ed team if you are unsure. We are here to help, and we have the most up-to-date information to guide you through.



3 March UPenn Alumni Sharing Session, How to Prepare a Solid US App

We hosted Mr Shakti Desai in March for a sharing session on his experience at UPenn and how students can prepare an outstanding US application. Shakti holds an MBA from INSEAD and a dual degree in Finance & Engineering from the University of Pennsylvania. As a UPenn alumni interviewer for over 10 years, he has in-depth knowledge of the admissions process.

For Students Applying to the US

Activities – Numbers matter. With admissions officers reading thousands of applications, quantifying your impact helps your activities stand out. Use action verbs and aim to highlight a few high-impact commitments that show leadership, initiative, or sustained involvement.

SAT – If you're considering submitting SAT scores, aim to take the test earlier in Year 6—especially if you're planning to apply Early Action or Early Decision. This will help you manage your workload and avoid piling on stress toward the end of the year.

Thinking of Applying to Oxbridge? :

Oxbridge is looking for more than just top grades—they want to see how you think. There's no perfect answer, but successful applicants are those who can communicate their thoughts clearly, show intellectual curiosity, and demonstrate a teachable mindset. The process is holistic, with a strong emphasis on academic exploration beyond the classroom.

UK Personal Statement

It matters—but don't let it take over your time. A well-written statement should show your motivation and subject interest, but remember: preparing for admissions tests is just as important.

Oxbridge Interview Tips

They're looking for logical, reflective thinkers. Stay on topic, answer concisely, and don't be afraid to pause and gather your thoughts. It's not about having all the answers—it's about how you approach a problem.

Supercurriculars (go beyond the syllabus) for UK Applications:

- Wide reading in your chosen subject
- Research (including IAs/EE but not limited to these)
- Online courses or MOOCs
- Independent projects (blogs, apps, simulations)
- Subject-relevant internships
- Awards or competitions (especially those you can reflect on deeply)
- Olympiads, Essay Competitions, Model United Nations (MUN), Debates, Hackathons

Preparing for the Interview

The interview isn't about getting everything "right"—it's about how you think. Show genuine enthusiasm and curiosity for your chosen subject. Be prepared to explore ideas, question assumptions, and think critically under pressure.

Portfolio Tips

There is no one-size-fits-all approach. Some students present a wide range of activities, others show deep commitment in one area. A strong portfolio often strikes a balance between both. Most importantly, it should reflect a clear theme that connects to who you are and what drives you.

Different Starting Points

- David began by listing his key activities and honours to build the foundation of his application.
- Om started with his essays, using them to shape the narrative for the rest of his materials.

Find what works best for you—but make sure all parts of your application speak to your passion, purpose, and potential.


Youth Health Ambassadors Programme (YHAP) at NUS

Job Shadowing Programme (17 to 21 March 2025)

The immersive Job Shadowing programme offers students a unique opportunity to gain first-hand insight into the professional world, enhancing their teamwork, collaboration, and problem-solving skills in real-world environments. It nurtures inquirers who are eager to explore unfamiliar industries, and communicators who learn to engage meaningfully with professionals across diverse fields. By observing workplace dynamics and reflecting on their experiences, students develop a deeper understanding of their personal interests and strengths — hallmarks of the reflective learner. Above all, the programme encourages students to act with integrity and respect in professional settings, embodying what it means to be principled. More significantly, it has helped many students solidify their career aspirations and map out their higher education pathways beyond the International Baccalaureate Diploma.

During the week-long March break, a record 63 senior division students explored various industries through job shadowing — a remarkable achievement in such a short time. Among them, 21 students gained exposure to medical institutions and veterinary practices, while 19 delved into the commercial sector, spanning Business & Operations, Sales & Marketing, Communication & Media, and Finance. Additionally, 13 students explored Engineering, 6 immersed themselves in the legal field, and others ventured into diverse industries.

Overall, the Job Shadowing programme transformed the holiday into an enriching and purposeful experience.

Academic Enrichment Programme: Preparing Year 5 and 6 Students for IB Success

The Academic Enrichment Programme (AEP) held on 10 and 11 March 2025 was a pivotal event in the academic journey of Year 5 and 6 students, aiming to equip them with the tools for success in the International Baccalaureate (IB) curriculum. Focused on the Extended Essay (EE), Creativity, Activity, Service (CAS), and Theory of Knowledge (TOK) IB Core components, the two-day event offered valuable insights and practical experience in these key areas.

IB Core Launch and Implementation

The programme began with Year 5 students participating in the EE Launch. This session introduced them to the EE syllabus, research methodologies, and the process of topic selection. A key highlight was the EE Café, where students attended presentations by Heads of Faculty and subject representatives, gaining discipline-specific insights into EE expectations and research strategies. This interactive session provided students with an understanding of how to approach research across different subjects.

In addition to EE, Year 5 students engaged in CAS Project planning, collaborating with peers from diverse cultural backgrounds. They worked together to refine and develop their projects, focusing on creativity, leadership, and social responsibility. These discussions allowed students to apply their learning to real-world challenges while gaining a deeper appreciation of cross-cultural perspectives.

A notable highlight for Year 5 was the TOK and Collaboration Science Project at Pasir Ris Park. Students explored TOK concepts such as Evidence, Interpretation, Justification, and Perspective while examining the theme of Knowledge and Technology. The project posed the question: How do the tools we use shape the knowledge we produce? Through field studies, students debated whether technology merely extends human senses or introduces fundamentally new ways of perceiving the world. This hands-on experience linked the TOK Knowledge Framework: Methods and Tools, and Ethics, with real-world applications, enhancing students' understanding of academic theory in practice.

For Year 6 students, the focus of the programme was on intensive support for their EE writing. With guidance from faculty mentors, students worked on structuring and refining their research papers, ensuring adherence to IB standards. Teachers provided critical feedback on areas such as analysis, citation practices, and academic writing coherence, reinforcing the importance of scholarly rigor and discipline.

Intercultural Learning and Global Perspectives

Intercultural learning was a central theme throughout the programme. Students discussed how cultural contexts influence research methodologies and knowledge construction, particularly in TOK sessions. The CAS initiatives emphasised local and/or global engagement, with students encouraged to design projects that address international and cross-cultural issues. These sessions fostered a deeper understanding of the global impact of academic work, encouraging students to think beyond local contexts and engage with worldwide perspectives. We look forward to witnessing the continued growth and success of our IB learners as they apply the insights gained through this programme in their academic pursuits and beyond.

THIMUN Reflections

ACS (International) sent a group to The 57th Hague International Model United Nations (THIMUN) earlier this year, and Aryav Bhesania (6 CKS) did us proud by taking on the role of Deputy Secretary-General. Below is his account of his experiences.

THIMUN at The Hague is the pinnacle of any Model UN journey. It is the world's second-largest Model United Nations (MUN) conference and welcomes more than 4,000 delegates annually to the UN World Forum, celebrating diplomacy at the highest level.

This year, I had the immense privilege of serving as Deputy Secretary-General, a position at THIMUN's highest executive level. Over five months, I worked closely with officers to ensure seamless logistics, refine procedural knowledge, and guide research efforts. But the defining moment came when I was invited to meet and be interviewed by the world's most influential policymakers, including the former Dutch Prime Minister, Dutch Ministers of Defence and Foreign Affairs, the head of the North Atlantic Treaty Organisation (NATO), and the ex-US Consul General. Among these discussions, my interview with the Secretary-General of NATO stood out as a defining moment. The discussion focused on adapting NATO to strategic competition, cyber warfare, and evolving deterrence. I emphasised the need for NATO to treat cyberattacks on critical infrastructure as potential triggers for Article 5, marking a shift toward a digitally resilient alliance. This discussion will shape youth perspectives on security and be featured at the 2025 NATO Summit, where more than 5,000 global diplomats, including 80 world leaders and presidents, will convene.

Beyond policy, THIMUN 2025 reaffirmed my belief in diplomacy's power. From guiding delegates in advanced committees like NATO, the ICC, and the Security Council to witnessing resolutions take shape, this experience was one of profound growth. Not just about diplomacy on paper, THIMUN was about preparing the next generation to navigate and lead in a complex global landscape. As I sign off from this role, being my last conference after a lengthy run, I leave with a deep appreciation for the power of international cooperation and the belief that young minds, when given the right platform, can shape the future of diplomacy.

Student Reflection on Watching A Doll's House

On 12 March, I had the opportunity to watch *A Doll's House, Part 2*, written by Lucas Hnath. The play is a sequel to the play *A Doll's House* by Henrik Ibsen. ACS (International) Year 5 English A students and teachers gathered at the Victoria Theatre, buzzing with anticipation to see what had happened 15 years after Nora Helmer, the heroine of the original play, slammed the door and left everything behind to find herself.

The play explores themes of identity, societal norms, and expectations. It made me think about how much the world has changed since the 1870s, when the original play was set, and how some of the same struggles still exist today. What made Part 2 compelling was that it didn't just focus on Nora's journey, but also gave voice to the people she left behind. Torvald, once the embodiment of patriarchy, was not just a villain, but was conflicted, hurt, and human. Anne Marie, the nanny who had to take care of the mess left behind, showed what it was like for people who didn't have the privilege of walking away. Then there was Emmy, Nora's daughter, all grown up, with her own strong opinions. She was not just the abandoned child, but had built a life of her own, and her perspective on marriage and independence clashed with Nora's.

One of the things I loved most was how the play balanced sharp humour with deep, thought-provoking moments. The dialogue was fast-paced and witty, making the heavy themes more digestible while still packing an emotional punch. The actors brought so much energy to their roles, making it easy to connect with each character. The minimalist set design also stood out, as it did not distract from the story but instead kept the focus on the intense conversations unfolding on stage.

Reflecting on the experience, I found myself questioning my own views on independence, responsibility, and what it means to truly be free. Nora's story is often seen as empowering, but Part 2 made me realise that freedom isn't just about leaving but is also about what comes after.

All in all, I really enjoyed the play, and I would like to thank the English Faculty for giving us this amazing opportunity.






